Managers Appointed for the Primary. FREE COINAGE.

Pursuant to order the County Executive Committee met this 3d of August. The following managers were appointed to conduct the primary election on the 25th of August and any subsequent elections required to be held under the rules of the party: Laurens Church—A. Summerell, J. M. Clark, Walter Harmon. Hopewell—A. C. Workman, J. L. Crawford, George Hopkins.

Mountville—M. B. Crisp, R. T. Dunlap, B. P. Foster. The ratio of sixteen to one means that there shall be sixteen times as much silver in a silver dollar as there is gold in a gold dollar. The ratio is based upon the presumption that gold is sixteen times more valuable than silver; or would be if the nation adopted free coinage of silver, thus giving it an equal chance with gold.

The Biblical Recorder, from which the above paragraph is taken, says: "We have given more thought to the question in the past few years than to any other." If this is so, our contemporary ought to be able to give a more intelligent account of free coinage than is contained in this extract. The editor quoted confounds free and gratuitous coinage. "Free coinage exists where any owner of bullion has the right to have it coined on the same terms as the government, whether with or without a seigniorage charge." Hence there may be free coinage where there is a seigniorage, or charge for coinage. Gratuitous coinage means that no seigniorage is charged for the work of coining, i. e., the mint value and the bullion value of the coins are the same.

Hence also there may be gratuitous coinage where there is a seigniorage, but not exist, that is, only a limited amount of bullion may be admitted to the mint and coined gratuitously. Free coinage of silver might mean, therefore, any one of several things, gratuitous limited coinage, free and unlimited coinage, or gratuitous and unlimited coinage. As a matter of fact, in the present discussions on the subject, it signifies the latter, i. e., there is to be no seigniorage charge and the profits arising from converting bullion into money are to belong to the owner of the bullion, and on the other hand, no limit is to be fixed to the amount of bullion admitted to the mints; the mint's capacity being the only limit to the volume of silver coined.

This is the doctrine of "free coinage of silver" as advocated at present by a great many people. "The other point as to the ratio, sixteen to one, does not mean that gold is sixteen times as valuable as silver, or that silver is one-sixteenth as valuable as gold, but that the government fiat can establish the ratio of value as it pleases. This is really the gist of the question in dispute. Those who believe in the omnipotence of government settle it in one way; those who believe that governments do not create economic laws, but are rigidly subject to them, settle it in another way. The question is before the people of the United States, and before they venture to cast their votes they should study the question. If the voter does not study the subject he is not morally competent to vote. For this is, to some extent, a moral issue. Let the people seek light on this subject and that not from demagogues, but from those who have studied the subject. There are some who have studied it for more than "three years."—The Baptist Courier.
