Child Labor. After a hard fight child labor in the General Assembly was killed. It was very well, considering the manufactur-ing conditions in the State. As we have before urged manufactures are in leading strings in this State and the proposed legislation was premature The matter of child labor is no great evil as ye'. When in fact manufac-tures assume importance, the demand to regulate child labor will come, when the hills are capped with smoke stacks and the roar of machinery is heard all around. The textile industries will probably grow. It seems to be uncontradicted that the South can produce cotton to any extent—only limited by the capital and labor supplies. As agriculture ceases to be profitable labor as well as the dollar will cease to fool with it—men do not idle away muscle. with it-men do not idle away muscle nor money. The time will come when every stick of timber, rawhide, bone and feather will be subjected in this State to skilful handling, and become materials of wealth instead of waste. It is therefore wise for the people of this State to encourage by every means the present tendency to multiply industries for those whose multiply industries for those whose destiny is to work.

Ticklish. In redistricting the State for Con-In redistricting the State for Congressional representation the General Assembly every ten years (or new census) has a delicate job. Counties or divisions must be placed so as to secure "compact" and "contiguous" territory. The difficulty arises in avoiding putting two incumbent Congressmen in the same District—as one in such case would necessarily have to go overboard. Here comes in the "politics," trading, scheming, and wire pulling. To illustrate—here is a young Demosthenes who thinks he could lift the rafters at Washington—in last campaign, well Washington-in last campaign, well called "spell-binders"—he agrees with an incumbent to vote to fix to suit him on condition that he retire after a term and throw the weight of h's m'ghty influence in favor of the coming Calhoun. And thus there are a thousand tricks, and maneuvers in the scramble for political place.




