HOW TO COOK THE HUSBANDS NICELY.

Recipes for the Laurens Ladies.

TO MAKE MEN TENDER.

The Proper Seasoning and Sweetening.

Some Sound Advice that Deserves Careful Attention and Consideration by the Feminine Mind.

The following from the Worcester, Mass., Special is respectfully submitted to the dear ladies of Laurens town and county:

Many husbands are spoiled by mismanagement in cooking and are not so tender and good. Some good wives keep their husbands constantly in hot water; others keep them in a stew by irritating ways. Some roast them; some keep them in a pickle all their lives; others think they need to be blown up occasionally and others let them freeze by their carelessness and indifference.

It cannot be supposed that any husband will be tender and good, managed in this way. But they can be made really fine and delicious when properly cooked.

In selecting a husband a woman should not be guided by the silvery appearance, as in buying fish, nor by the golden tint, as if she wished salmon. Be sure and select him yourself, as tastes differ. Do not go to the market for him, as the best are always brought to the door. It is far better to have none, unless you will learn positively how to cook him. See that the linen in which you wrap him is nicely washed and mended, with the required number of strings and buttons sewed on. A preserving kettle of the finest porcelain is best; but if you have only an earthenware kettle, it will do, with care. Tie him in the kettle with the silken cord called love, as the one called duty is always weak. They are apt to fly or get burned and crusty on the edges, since like crabs and lobsters, you have to cook them while alive. Make a bright, steady fire out of comfort, cheerfulness and neatness; set him as near this as seems to agree with him. If he sputters and fizzes do not be anxious, as some husbands do this until they are done. Add a little sugar in the form of what confectioners call kisses. But use no vinegar or pepper on any account. A little spice improves, but it must be used with judgment.

Do not stick any sharp instrument into him to see if he is becoming tender. You cannot fail to know when he is done.

If thus cooked you will find him very digestible, agreeing nicely with you, and he will keep perfectly, unless you become careless and set him in too cool a place.

JAPAN HAS WON FIRST VICTORIES.

Two Nations Have Begun to Fight.

SHIPS DESTROYED.

About Twenty Russian Vessels Eliminated.

Two Battles Fought in Which the Small Scrappers Have Had the Best of It.

On the 9th. at Port Arthur the Japanese torpedo boats destroyed or disabled three Russian men-of-war. About the same time the Japs destroyed two Russian ships at Chemulpo without losing a man.

So far the Japs have had the best of it. It is said that they put a quietus on 20 Russian ships, great and small.

However, the Japs seem not to have effected a landing yet at Port Arthur. It is reported that some small Jap ships have been destroyed and that they were defeated in trying to land men near Port Arthur.

The war news is indefinite. The only thing certain is that so far the Yellows have gained the advantage decidedly on the sea.

The outlook is favorable to the Japs. They have a navy nearly equal to that of Russia. Their army is about one-fourth as big but they have a third of a million men splendidly armed and magnificently trained by American and European officers.

Admiral Uru who won the Port Arthur fight graduated at the Annapolis Naval Academy and six other Jap ship commanders are graduates from it.

The Japs are on the ground and know ground. The Russian land forces must travel from two to four thousand miles. The Japs have landed 20,000 more at Chemulpo.

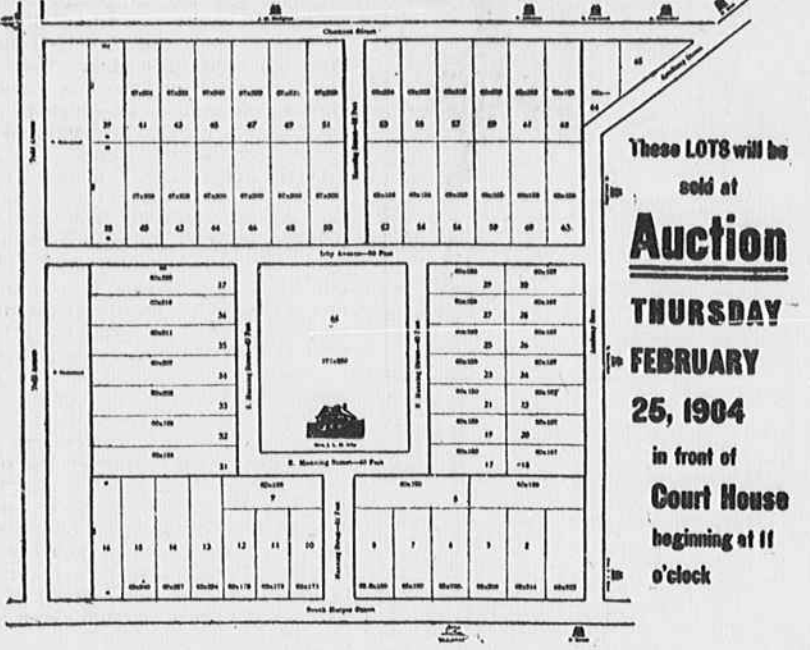

WILL ADJOURN AT WEEK'S END.

General Assembly Wind-up Its Work. VERY LITTLE DONE.

Mr. Bryan Invited to Make a Speech.

Prospects are that No New Court Circuits Will Be Created—Members Say Bad Words.

The general assembly will adjourn at the end of this week. The new circuit bill has little chance of passage.

Representative Copper introduced a resolution to invite W. J. Bryan to address the general assembly this week and it passed. Mr. Bryan will speak Friday night in Spartanburg.

When the state house report was under discussion in the house, warm words passed between W. J. Johnson, of Fairfield, member of the commission, and Yancey Williams, of Lancaster, of the committee which made the report. The words "lie" and "liar" were freely used.

Mr. Irby's bill to make the metal checks issued by cotton mills redeemable in money passed the house.

The immigration bureau bill is receiving strong backing from newspaper men.

Senator Dean's vagrancy law is still pending in the senate. Some senators claim that it would make a system of penance.

A resolution providing that suit be brought against the architect who botched the State House has passed. However it may be set down that the State will recover nothing. It's too late.

Senator Brice's bill to allow communities to vote away dispensaries is still pending. So is the Doyle anti-treating bill.

SENATOR HANNA DIED MONDAY.

Succumbed to Attack of Typhoid Fever.

MOURNING GENERAL.

Was In His Sixty-Seventh Year.

He Came Into Prominence in the McKinley Campaign and Was a Power in Politics.

United States Senator Marcus Alonzo Hanna died at his hotel in Washington, D. C., of typhoid fever, 6:40 P. M. Monday.

Senator Hanna came into prominence as manager of Mr. McKinley's successful candidacy in 1896, and afterwards became Senator, first by appointment and then election.

Senator Hanna began life as a poor boy and amassed great wealth as a coal and iron merchant.

No man was ever more persistently abused by the newspapers opposed to him in politics and deserved it less. He was selected as the "scape-goat" of the so-called Money Power and ridiculed cruelly. Before he died the country had reached a different conclusion.

As a matter of fact, his record as an honest man was uncommonly clean, and the only grave offence chargeable to him was that he usually succeeded in his undertakings. He was an able, industrious man, endowed with an unusual amount of brains. Therefore he made money.

Mr. Hanna probably got along with the labor in his employ better than any great capitalist in the country. Cleveland, Ohio, was his home.

EARLE WILL RUN FOR COMMISSIONER.

Able Young Lawyer Who Aspires to Succeed Mr. Garrison—Sketch of His Career.

The following is from R. W. Simson's Columbia correspondence with the Greenville News, of which he is editor:

Friends of Major John H. Earle, a well known member of the Greenville bar, and a son of the lamented Joseph H. Earle, United States Senator from South Carolina, announced today that he would be a candidate for railroad commissioner in the next Democratic primary. This statement has created unusual interest in political circles here in view of the fact that the campaign has not yet been formally launched, but it indicates a determination of Major Earle's friends to make a most aggressive fight. There will probably be several candidates in the field and Chairman Garrison, whose term will shortly expire, will doubtless stand for re-election. At this time however, when the importance of the commission appeals so strongly to the commercial element and business people generally, the fact that a lawyer, well-versed in the intricacies of the railroad situation and one who received a practical education as an engineer, will make the race, meets the approval of that large class which believes it not only wise but necessary to have a lawyer on the board, a rule which has operated most successfully in other States.

Major Earle was born and raised in Sumter. He was educated at the Sumter High School in early life, going from there to McCabe's University at Petersburg, Va., finally graduating from the South Carolina Military Academy in Charleston. He moved to Greenville where he has been practicing his profession for the past ten years. He was private secretary to Senator Earle, and when war was declared against Spain he was commissioned a captain by President McKinley, but resigned that commission to accept the position of major of the First South Carolina Volunteers, this having been tendered him by the late Governor Ellerbe, served at Columbia, Chickamauga, Jacksonville and Savannah, having at one time been chief executive officer of the Third Division Hospitals, Seventh army corps and acting inspector general on the staff.

It was due to the work of Major Earle and Lieut. Wyatt Aiken, now a member of Congress that the regiment was equipped with new army tents and uniforms when they were so badly needed at Jacksonville. Major Earle was in partnership with Senator Earle at the time of the latter's death, and at different times was associated with the late Capt. Mooney, Congressman Joseph T. Johnson, of Spartanburg, and Mr. F. F. Beattie, of Greenville. He organized and is now attorney and manager of loans for the New Loan and Trust Company of Greenville.
