JAPAN HAS WON FIRST VICTORIES.

Two Nations Have Begun to Fight.

SHIPS DESTROYED.

About Twenty Russian Vessels Eliminated.

Iwo Battles Fought in Which the Small Scrappers Have Had the Best of It.

Oa the 9th, at Port Arthur the Japnese torpedo boats destroyed or disabled three Russian men-of-war. About the same time the Japs destroyed two Russian ships at Chemulpo without losing a man.

So far the Japs have had the best of it. It is said that they put a quietus on 20 Russian ships, great and small.

However, the Japs seem not to have ffected a landing yet at Port Arthur. It is reported that some small Jap ships have been destroyed and that they were defeated in trying to land men near Port Arthur.

The war news is indefinite. The only thing certain is that so far the Yellows have gained the advantage decidedly on the sea.

The outlook is favorable to the Japs. They have a navy nearly equal to that of Russia. Their army is about onefourth as big but they have a third of million men splendidly armed and magnificently trained by American and European officers.

Admiral Uriu who won the Port Arthur fight graduated at the Annapolis Naval Academy and six other Jap ship commanders are graduates from

The Japs are on the ground and know ground. The Russian land forces must travel from two to four thousand miles. The Japs have lauded 20,000 more at Chemu'po.





SENATOR HANNA DIED MONDAY.

Succumbed to Attack of Typhoid Fever.

MOURNING GENERAL.

Was In His Sixty-Seventh

Year. He Came Into Prominence in the Mc-Kinley Campaign and Was a

United States Senator Marcus Alonzo Hanna died at his hotel in Washington, D. C', of typhoid fever, 6:40 P. M. Mon-

Power in Politics.

Sena'or Hanna came into prominence as manager of Mr. McKinley's successful candidacy in 1896, and afterwards became Senator, first by appointment

and then election. Senator Hanna began life as a poor boy and amassed great wealth as :

coal and iron merchant. No man was ever more persistently abused by the newspapers opposed to him in politics and deserved it less. He was selected as the "scape-goat" of the so-called Money Power and ridiculed cruelly. Before he died the country had reached a different conclusion. As a matter of fact, his record as an honest man was uncommonly clean, and the only grave offence chargeable to him was that he usually succeeded in his undertakings. He was an able, industrious man, endowed with an unusual amount of brains. Therefore he made money.

Mr. Hanna probably got along with the labor in his employ better than any great capitalist in the country.

EARLE WILL RUN FOR COMMISSIONER

Able Young Lawyer Who Aspires to Succeed Mr. Garris-Sketch of His Career.

The following is from R. W. Simson's Columbia correspondence with the Greenville News, of which he is

Friends of Major John H. Earle, a well known member of the Greenville bar, and a son of the lamented Joseph H. Earle, United State Senator from South Carolina, announced today that he would be a candidate for railroad commissioner in the next Democratic primary. This statement has created unusual interest in political circ'es here in view of the fact that the campaign has not yet been formally aunched, but it indicates a determination of Major Earle's friends to make a nost aggressive fight. There will probably be several candidates in the field and Chairman Garris, whose term will shortly expire, will doubtless stand for re-election. At this time however, when the importance of the commission appeals so strongly to the commer cial element and business people generally, the fact that a lawyer, well versed in the intricacies of the railroad situation and one who received a practical education as an engineer, will make the race, meets the approval of that large class which believes it not only wise but necessary to have a lawyer on the board, a rule which has operated most successfully in other

Major Earle was born and raised in

Sumter. He was educated at the Sumter High School in early life, going from there to McCabe's University at Petersburg, Va., finally graduating from the South Carolina Military Academy in Charleston. He moved to Greenville where he has been practicing his profession for the past ten years. He was private secretary to Senator Earle, and when war was declared against Spain he was commissioned a captain by President McKinley, but resigned that commission to accept the position of major of the First South Carolina Volunteers, this having been tendered him by the late Governor Ellerbe, served at Columbia, Chickamauga, Jacksonville and Savannab, having at one time been chief executive officer of the Third Division Hospitals, Seventh army crops and acting inspector general on the staff. It was due to the work of Major Earle and Lieut. Wyatt Aiken, now a memper of Congress that the regiment was equipped with new army tents and uniorms when they were so badly needed at Jacksonville. Major Earle was in partnership with Senator Earle at the the time of the latter's death, and at different times was associated with the ate Capt. Mooney, Congressman Joseph T. Johnson, of Spartanburg, and Mr. F. F. Beattie, of Greenville. He organized and is now attorney and manager of loans for the new Loan and Trust Cempany of Greenville.

MADE BIG YIELD.

Something About the Method of Cultivation.

Plant Has a Large Weed and Should Have Pienty of Room-The Price it Brings .

Below appears an interesting letter from Mr. E. G. Mitchell about the Flo-

rodora cotton With short-staple at 13 cents, a half of bale of Florodora cotton at 15 cents would be worth \$37.50. Mr. Mitchell planted on June 5th and had a poor

stand. His seed are worth \$25. However, the premium above common varieties is from four to six cents. That is what the originator, Mr. Stoney, claims for it. This year no one in this locality had more than a bale. No one even had a full bale. Cousequently, it was difficult to find a market. As soon as fifty or a hundred bales are raised in the county there will be plenty of bids for the cotton and doubtless a far better price will be

EDITOR ADVERTISER ---Dear Sir :- I promised sometime ago to give my experience with Florodora cotton.

Now, to begin with, I wish to say I have no seed for sale, (no axe to grind), but as I obtained the seed from you, and others also wish to know my experience with said cotton, I will en-

I did not get the seed until late in

the spring of last year, and had planted all my land, but as I saw in THE AD-VERTISER that Mr. Stoney said that the cotton would make after oats in June, I planted mine after wheat in June, planting June 5th. I had little faith in it; did not think a long-staple cotton would have time to make after that date, but I turned my land, planted on a level, fertilized in drill with cotton seed meal and acid at the rate of 300 pounds per acre. I planted naif-bushelse d on half an acre of land, but did not get over a half stand. I made half a bale of cotton, and ten bashels of seed worth at the present price twent-five dollars. This cotton makes a large weed, and I would say to all who contemplate planting it, to give good distance in row and in drill, Land that will make one thousand pounds of the common varieties per acre should have rows four feet wide by two in the drill. My cotton grew very large and opened white to the top. I ginned this cotton with my Hall gin, and found no trouble in ginning it. I have a sample of it now, which is very beautiful, worth two cents more per ound on the m rket than the common cotton in fifty bate lots, so the buyer
