NEGRO BOY DROWNED.
George Walker Lost His Life Monday by Drowning.

George Walker, a 16 year old colored errand boy of this city was drowned in Barksdale's pond a mile above town Monday afternoon about two o'clock. His body was immediately recovered and medical aid summoned, but to no avail. George, with two smaller boys, was bathing in the pond. All of them had been diving, etc., when it was noticed that George was strangling and sinking. Efforts were made by the frightened boys to save him, but he was lifeless when they got him on the bank.

The boy was evidently seized with cramps as the water where he drowned is said to be not over three feet deep. The inquest was held late Monday evening and a verdict was returned in accordance with the above facts.

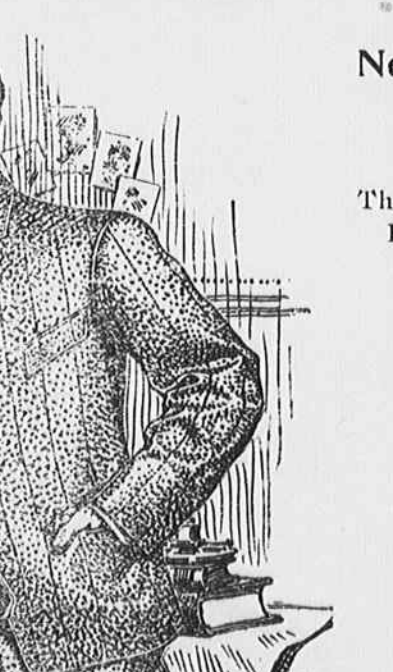
