President Roosevelt last Friday announced the following appointments in his cabinet, effective July 1st: W. H. Moody, Secretary of the Navy, to be Attorney General, Paul Morton, of Illinois, Secretary of the Navy, Victor H. Metcalf, of California, Secretary of Commerce and Labor.
Geo. B. Cortelyou, Secretary of Commerce and Labor, has been selected as Chairman of the Republican National Committee. He has resigned his cabinet position, effective July 1.
Edward W. Kingsly Post No 113, G. A. R., of Boston, has invited thirty prominent ex-Confederates to be their guests during the National Encampment of the G. A. R. August 15, Col. James Simons of Charleston, Gen. Stephen D. Lee and the late Col. Jas. A. Hoyt, of Greenville, whose recent death was probably unknown to them, are of the number.
In his annual message to the Georgia Legislature now in session, Governor Terrell recommends the establishment of an Immigration Commission for the State.
Capt. R. B. Glenn of Winston-Salem was last week nominated for Governor of North Carolina by the State Democratic Convention.

Loa Perdicaris and Cromwell Varley, who have been held for ransom by Moroccan bandits, whose chief is Raisuli, were released last Friday. Perdicaris returned to his home in Tangier Saturday morning, being received by the town authorities, the admirals of the fleet and many personal friends.
