Meeting of Executive Committee.
The County Democratic Executive Committee met in the court house Monday to arrange for the County Primary campaign. The meeting was called to order by Chairman G. P. Smith and organized by the election of a Secretary.

Every Democratic Club in the County was represented except Jacks, as follows:

Mr. Mason, of Jacks, was unavoidably absent.
Voting precincts were established at the Watts Cotton Mill, and the Lydia Cotton Mill, at Clinton. Another precinct was established at Laurens C. H., at which the two Democratic Clubs will vote—No. 1 at the Opera House, and No. 2 at the Court House. This action was deemed necessary in order to expedite the counting of the votes.

Chairman G. P. Smith and R. A. Cooper were appointed a sub-committee to confer with President Lucas for the purpose of securing the Mineral Spring Park for holding the State Campaign meeting.

The assessments of candidates was the next thing in order, and it was decided to assess all candidates (except Magistrates) as follows:

In connection with the assessment of candidates, it was resolved that all candidates must pay their assessments at the time of filing pledge, in order to have same recognized, in accordance with the following Rule governing the conduct of Primary elections:

Rule 8. Candidates for the General Assembly and for County Offices shall file with the Chairman of the County Executive Committee a pledge in writing to abide the result of the primary and support the nominee thereof. Provided, That the pledge of such candidate shall be filed on or before 12 o'clock, meridian, of the day preceding the day fixed by the County Executive Committee or the State Executive Committee for the first campaign meeting of the County or State respectively. No vote for any candidate who has not paid his assessment nor complied with this rule shall be counted.

Some little discussion was indulged in in reference to a schedule for the Township meetings, and the one accepted was that proposed by Mr. T. R. L. Gray, with a slight alteration, as follows:

The following Resolution was offered and adopted unanimously, by a standing vote:

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this committee, that no person who has directly or indirectly aligned himself with the Republican party should be allowed to participate in the Democratic Primary campaign or election in any way, and that this committee hereby warn the Democratic voters of Laurens County that no person who has so aligned himself by accepting favors at the hands of the Republicans, or otherwise, should be counted in the councils of the Democratic party.

It was moved that the County Chairman confer with other County Chairmen with a view to arranging meetings for Congressional and Solicitor candidates.

It was decided to publish the names of the Managers later, and the several Township Committees are requested to send to the County Chairman the names of the managers for the different precincts in their Townships by the first day of August next.
