On the day of the election the Managers must organize by the election of a chairman; a clerk may be named if necessary. The chairman elected is empowered to administer the oath to the other Managers and clerk. The Managers have the power to fill any vacancy, and if none of the Managers attend, the citizens can appoint managers from among the qualified voters, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election. At the close of the election the Managers must proceed publicly to open the ballots and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result thereof and sign the same. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Federal Elections the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots, and signed statements of the result of the election. One of the above-named Managers for each precinct must call upon the Board of Commissioners, at the Court House, Nov. 9th, 1904, to receive ballot boxes, poll lists and instructions and to qualify. Singing Fish.
The scieva, a little six inch deep variety of the lagoons of Italy, sticks its head above the water and sings a dainty song equal to that of some species of warbling birds. It is known to every fisherman of the Danube and the Rhine by the peculiar rattling noise it makes. It is a most curious and amusing sight to see a scieva in a pond, while the scieva gather in bands to hold regular concerts, which no doubt originated the fable of the singing fish. Some naturalists have likened the note of the scieva to that of the cuckoo. There are many different kinds of fish which give utterance to more or less musical notes. The scieva, a large sea fish, when swimming in shoals, utters a purring noise that may be heard from a depth of twenty fathoms. Lieutenant White, in his "Voyage to the China Seas," relates that his crew and himself were extremely astonished by hearing certain musical notes from beneath and around the vessel. They were various, like the bass notes of an organ, the sound of bells, the croaking of frogs and a pervading twang which the imagination might have attributed to the vibrations of some enormous harp. For a time the mysterious music swelled upon them and finally formed a universal chorus all round, but as the vessel ascended the river the sounds diminished in strength and soon ceased.—Home Magazine.

Real Turkish Coffee.
Here is a Turkish receipt for making Turkish coffee obtained in the Byrlian quarter of New York, where the finest coffee in the world is sold at 5 cents a cup in restaurants which are exact duplicates of those in Smyrna and Beirut: Put three lumps of sugar into a little pot, turn in the water and bring it to a boil. Then put in two teaspoonfuls of very finely ground Mocha coffee. As soon as the froth rises lift the pot and tap the bottom until the froth disappears. Do this three times. Then turn the coffee into delicate china cups, giving each cupful a share of froth. The coffee should be freshly roasted and ground, and the grounds should be so fine as to pass the palate unnoticed. Turks always drink the grounds, considering them, indeed, to be the best part of a cup of coffee.

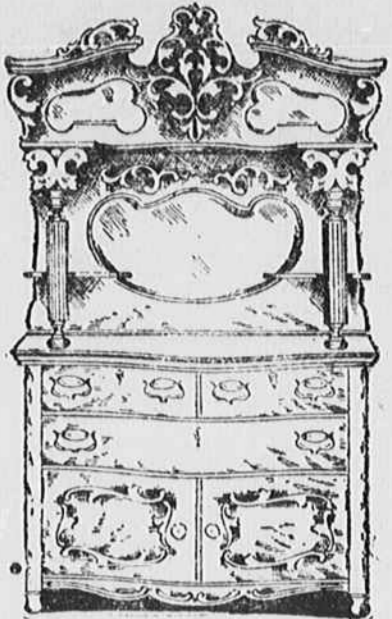
