Whereas, a petition has been filed in my office purporting to be signed by one-fourth of the qualified voters of Laurens County asking for an election under and according to the provisions of Act No. 276, approved the 25th day of February A. D. 1904, entitled "An Act to Amend Section 7 of An Act Entitled An Act to Provide for the Election of the State Board of Control, and to further Regulate the Sale, Use, Consumption, Transportation and Disposition of Intoxicating and Alcoholic Liquors or Liquids in this State, and Prescribe Further Penalties for Violation of the Dispensary Laws, and to Police the Same" Approved March 11, 1896, found on pages 485, 486 and 487 of the Acts of 1904, upon the question of "Dispensary" or "No Dispensary"; and Whereas, upon a canvass of the said petition I have found that the said petition does contain the signatures of one-fourth of the qualified voters of said County of Laurens.

Now, therefore, I, H. B. Humbert, Supervisor of Laurens County, South Carolina, by virtue of the authority in me vested by the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly already cited, do hereby order an election to be held according to law in said County of Laurens, South Carolina, on the question of "Dispensary" or "No Dispensary" on the second Tuesday of January, being the 9th day of the month, A. D. 1905, the said election to be held and conducted according to the laws governing other Special Elections.

Real Estate and Personal Property in Laurens Special School District No. 11, and Hunter Special No. 5 must be listed separately. It is always required that the Auditor get the first given name of the taxpayer in full. Under the head of "place of residence" on tax return, give the township. All male citizens between the ages of twenty one and sixty years, on the 1st of January, except those who are incapable of carrying a support, from being maimed, or from other causes are deemed taxable polls, Confederate veterans excepted. And all taxpayers are required to give the number of their school district. They are also requested to state whether the property is situated in town or country. After the 30th day of February next, fifty per cent penalty will be attached for failure to make returns.
