COUNTY TREASURER.

The Books of the County Treasurer will be open for the collection of State, County and commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1908, at the Treasurer's Office from Oct. 15th, to December 31st, 1908. After December 31st one per cent. will be added; after January 31st, two per cent, will be added; and after February 28th, seven per cent. will be added till the 15th day of March, when the Books will close.
All persons owning property in

more than one township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens, be-tween the ages of 21 and 60 years af age, are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00, except old soldiers who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commuta-tion Road Tax \$1.00 in lieu of road duty. Road Tax to be paid by the 1st day of March, 1909. Other taxes be paid at the time stated above.

Prompt attention will be given those who wish to pay their Taxes through the mail by check, money-

order, etc.

Persons sending in lists of names to be taken off are requested to forward them early, always giving their townships, as the Treasurer is very busy during the month of December.


