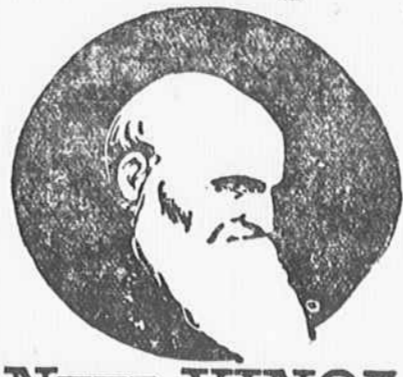
Mr. Meadows Laid to Rest.


