**Notice to School Officials.**

Section 1210, Code of Laws, Volume 1, as amended by the Act of the Legislature, approved February 17th, 1906, directs "Each County Board of Education, on the first Tuesday of July, 1896, and on the first Tuesday of July in every two years thereafter, shall appoint for each school district in their county three school trustees from the qualified electors and tax payers residing in the district, who shall hold their office for two years, and until their successors are appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the County Board of Education."

In consequence of this Act the Attorney General advises me that there will be no election or appointment of school trustees until 1910. According to the school law trustees should have been appointed in 1906 and again in 1908. Therefore the trustees who were appointed or elected, as the case may be, in 1907 will serve until 1910 except in case of vacancies by resignation, death or other causes.

This error has occurred in several counties over the State.
