TO BETTER PROTECT OUR CITY PROPERTY

Azsurance Commissioner McMaster Sends Letter to City Authorities Regarding Inspections.

State Insurance Commissioner F .H. McMaster has sent out to all municipol authorities a circular letter in which it is advised that a regular building code be adopted, that careful inspection of all property be made at regular intervals, removing all combustible materials, and that the authorities see that only such buildings as conform to the code be allowed built. Mayor Babb of this city has received the letter and the council will doubtless take the matter up at some early day

The letter is as follows:

"In the hope of reducing the fire waste in this state I call to your attention section 4 of the act of 1904 which gives the chief of the fire department, or chief of police, or intendant, where there is no chief of the fire department, the right to make examination of all buildings and premises within their several jurisdictions, at reasonable hours, and 'whenever any of said officers shall find in any building or upon any premises combustible material or inflammable conditions, dangerous to the safety of such building or premises, they shall order the same to be removed or rem-A like power is conferred upon the insurance commissioner, as the successor of the comptroller general, or his deputy, to act in a like

"It is the desire of this department to act in co-operation with the municipal authorities of the State, and to render such assistance as is within its power in such matters. In order that the assistance which this department is able to give, may not be overestimated, it is proper to say that the only fund at the disposal of the department for this purpose amounts to about \$1,500 a year, derived from a tax on fire insurance companies. This fund must be used primarily for the investigation of incendiary fires. The deputy of the department may aid in the inspection of buildings, only when he is not employed in investigating supposed incendiary fires.

"Hence the appeal is made to the municipal authorities to have made periodic examinations of all buildings and premises within their jurisdiction to discover 'combustible material, or inflammable conditions' and to have (these evils corrected. The suggestion is made that a house to house examination be made at least once each equarter.

"This matter is of such great importance that I should be glad to give all aid within my power, to furnish information concerning building codes or fire protection means. All requests for information or correspondence will be gladly answered

"I believe the following to be ax-

"(1) The destruction of property by fire is a loss of wealth to the world. and especially to the community in which it happens

"(3) Careful property owners should not be subject to loss either by direct destruction of their property, or by being laid under contribution to repair the losses of their care less or criminal neighbors

"Therefore the great need for the inunicipal authorities to take steps to prevent fire loss. It preserves wealth and money in the pockets of those who take care of their own property.

"With due respect I suggest:

"(1) The adoption of a building code by each municipality.

"(2) The careful inspection of all buildings in process of construction to see that they conform to the building code.

"(3) The quarterly inspection of all buildings and premises (whether a building code is adopted or not) to see that combustible material is removed, or inflammable conditions are




