**GALLANT SOLDIER IS DEAD.**

fr. W. F. Kelley of Clinton Answers Soldiers' Last Roll Call.

Mr. W. F. Kelley of Clinton, this county, died at his home on the 17th of August last. He served gallantly in the war of the sixties as a member of Co. D, 3rd S. C. battalion infantry, Kershaw's brigade. He was severely wounded at the sanguinary battle of Boonsboro, (South Mountain) on the 14th day of September, 1862, and left in the hands of the Federals. He was in prison for several months before he was discharged. It will be remembered that it was in this battle that the gallant George James, commanding the battalion, was killed and that the battalion was cut to pieces.

For the last four or five years, Mr. Kelley had been a sufferer from his wounds. During this period he had been to the hospital for treatment. His wounds hastened his death. He was in his 78th year and leaves a widow, Mrs. Margaret L. Kelley, who was a Miss Braddock of a well known and highly respected family of the Hurricane section of the county.
