## DR. GEO. L. MARTIN DIES AT GREENVILLE

Prominent Physician and Valuable Citizen Passes Away at Age of 55—Was a Native of Laurens.

Dr. Geo. L. Martin, a native and former citizen of Laurens county, died at his home in Greenville last Thursday. The Greenville News of Friday has the following account of his death:

Dr. George Lafayette Martin died yesterday morning at his home on the Buncombe road about ten o'clock. In the death of this man, the county and whole Piedmont section of the state loses one of its most influential and faithful servants. He was 55 years old at the time of his death, and leaves a family of four sons and a daughter. His wife, and a father 90 years old survive him also. Dr. Martin has been for the past eight years the special quarantine and vaccination agent of the state board of health, appointed for the counties of the Piedmont section of the state. The funeral will be held from the residence this morning, the services being at the First Baptist church at eleven o'clock. The masons will take a prominent part in the funeral, Dr. Martin having been one of the leading members of that fraternity.

Dr. Martin was born in Laurens county in the Poplar Springs section. He went to school in Laurens county and then came to Furman university in Greenville, and graduated there, taking the degree of B. A. After graduating at Furman, he studied medicine at the Baltimore Medical college, at Baltimore, Md., after which he practiced medicine in Laurens county for about eighteen years. He started out on his life's career quite young, having been practicing medicine when he was still a minor. Since he began to practice, however, he took two post graduate courses at the Baltimore college.

Twenty-five years ago, Dr. Martin married Miss Annie L. Stepp, a daughter of the Rev. A. C. Stepp. Mrs. Martin is a sister of Mr. Joseph A. McCullough of Greenville. They have been living in Greenville about ten years. Since that time Dr. Martin has been appointed special agent for the counties of the Piedmont section of the state for the supervision of the vaccination, quarantining and disinfecting wherever necessary. Since moving to Greenville he had bought the beautiful home surrounded by large shady trees, out on the Buncombe road, about two miles from the city. It is here that the family have been living for the past eight or ten years, in the calm serenity of country life, until the entrance of the sad intruder.

Dr. Martin leaves four sons, Broadas, John, Henry and Lewis, and a daughter, Georgia. He is survived also by his wife and a father, Mr. Lewis Martin, ninety years old. He also leaves an aunt, Mrs. W. B. Madden, who during his early years gave him the care and kind treatment of a son, his mother having died when he was an infant.

The funeral services were held at the First Baptist church on Friday morning and the interment made in the city cemetery.

### NOTICE OF ELECTION.

State of South Carolina,  
County of Laurens.  
Whereas, petitions signed by more than one third of the qualified electors and freeholders residing in Cross Hill school district, No. 2, Cross Hill township, Laurens county, South Carolina, asking for an election upon the question of levying a 2 mill tax upon property in said school district to be used for school purposes, have been filed with the County Board of Education, election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 25th day of September, 1909, at Pine Bluff school house, under the management of the school trustees of said school district.

Only such electors as return real or personal property for taxation and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required in the general election shall be allowed to vote. Those favoring the tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "Yes" written or printed thereon; those against the tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "No" written or printed thereon.

Polls shall open at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon and remain open until four o'clock when they shall close, and the ballots counted.

The Trustees shall report the result of said election to the County Auditor within ten days thereafter.
