MUSGROVE MILL.

Not long since a student of Clinton college gave us an interesting description of a visit to the historic Musgrove home. For the sake of Laurens county history I wish to correct some errors made by this correspondent. He stated that the old Musgrove dwelling was still standing. The present house was built by Dr. Ned Bobo, and my information states that "Ann" Betay Bobo raised him from infancy. In 1847 he was one of the carpenters that built that nice corkscrew stairway, and it and the Major Butler room of confinement on the second floor only exist in the imagination of the writer.

The old Revolutionary dwelling of Allen Musgrove stood one hundred and fifty yards from the present house and no part of it is now to be seen. This old house was on the west side of Enocce river in Laurens county; the old mill was also in Laurens.

This Musgrove property was willed to Dr. Ned Bobo by William Musgrove, who was a son of Allen Musgrove, and Betsy Musgrove married Dr. Bobo. William Musgrove's widow, Ann, married General Crane Jones.

COUNTY TREASURER

The books of the County Treasurer will be open for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1909, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31st, 1909. After December 31st, one per cent will be added. All January bills two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent will be added till the 15th day of March, 1910, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00, except old soldiers, who are exempt at fifty years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.00 in lieu of road duty. Road Tax to be paid by the 1st day of March, 1910. Other taxes to be paid at the time stated above.

Prompt attention will be given those who wish to pay their taxes through the mail by check, money-order, etc. Persons sending in lists of names to be taken off are requested to send them early, and give the township of each, as the treasurer is very busy during the month of December.
