CAPT. BABB'S FINE CHICKENS.

Declares That There Is Money and Pleasure in Poultry Business.

So often one hears the remark that "there's nothing in poultry raising" and "chickens are more trouble than they are worth" that few people are inclined to attempt this uncertain industry, particularly those who live in towns or cities. However, there are pleasing exceptions to the rule, one of which may be cited here in the city of Laurens. While he has not amassed a fortune in the chicken business, Capt. Oscar W. Babb has made some money in addition to supplying his table with chickens and eggs.

It may be worthy of note that Capt. Babb's chicken yard is scarcely more than 30 by 50 feet, which he has enclosed and covered with poultry wire. Besides this yard he has a barley patch adjoining, of about the same dimensions, and then a "scratch" yard of about 15 by 50 feet. The chickens are turned in the barley patch for about five minutes every day, and are always fed in the scratch yard.

Three years ago, Capt. Babb bought 6 white leghorn hens from Mr. Averhill at the Columbia State fair, paying \$1.50 each. From Wilber brothers in Petros, Tenn. he purchased a white leghorn cock, the price of which was \$10.00. Of the chickens he has raised he saved 6 pullets and now has 14 hens. Yesterday he got 11 eggs from the yard, a remarkable yield at this time of year; later in the spring he will get 12 and 13 eggs every day.

In addition to supplying his table with eggs, Capt. Babb sold 60 settings the first year, deriving from this source about \$60.00 besides the sale of \$10 worth of chickens. The second year he sold 40 settings for \$40 and about the same number of chickens. Averaging up the sales, he has made about \$50 a year on chickens and eggs, after supplying his table with both.

Asked what kind of chickens he liked the best, Capt. Babb said: "I prefer the white leghorn every time, first because it is the best laying chicken I know of and then because it is the prettiest". And to see his yard is sufficient proof of the latter statement.

Capt. Babb uses an 80-egg incubator and declares it very satisfactory. He says that right now is the best time of the year to raise incubator chickens; that they thrive now better than at any other time; later, he says, they will die of the white dysentery. They must be raised now, though, with the brooders.

Capt. Babb states that his efforts at chicken raising have been eminently satisfactory, that there is money in the business even on a small town lot and that there is a peculiar pleasure in working with pretty fowls.
