CHILDREN IN THE MILLS.

First of June New Law Goes Into Effect.

Important orders, relative to child labor, have been issued by Commissioner Watson as follows:

"In view of the fact that the first of June is rapidly approaching when, under section 6 of the laws of the State relating to child labor, permitting the summer employment of children under 12 years of age, during the months of June, July and August, the law becomes effective, this department has been requested to inform the textile manufacturers of the State, whether or not certificates issued in the year 1909 for the summer employment of children would hold good for their employment during the months of June, July and August, 1910.

The law only permits the employment of such a child upon the furnishing of a certificate that the child has attended school for not less than four months during the current school year, etc. This being so, it is necessary in every case of the employment of a child under this summer school exemption to file a new 1910 certificate upon the forms furnished for the purpose by this department. This certificate should be given the same registered number that was used on the certificate the preceding year, in case the child was employed in 1909, and this department should be notified of the filing of the certificate upon our card form No. 3, whereupon permit for summer employment will be issued. Certificates for 1909 cannot be recognized as covering any child's employment under the summer exemption clause, and the inspectors will be instructed to treat cases of such children if found in any mill, the same as if no papers had been prepared in their respective cases. In the case of a child who has heretofore been employed under the summer exemption clause the usual registered number statement together with the certificate must be prepared in the usual way, the duplicate statement being sent to the department, and the filing of certificate reported therewith on card Form 3. All certificates should have the certified endorsement of the teacher of the child as to the four months school during the year 1910.

Preparing Interesting List.

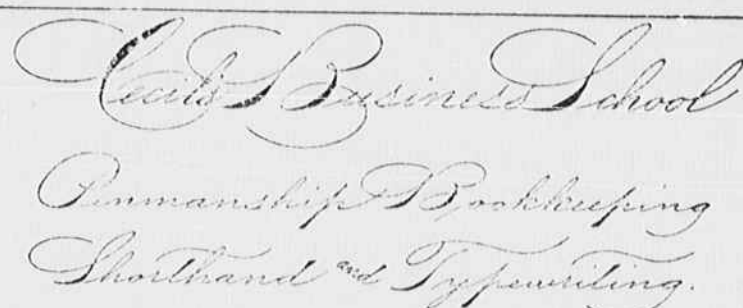

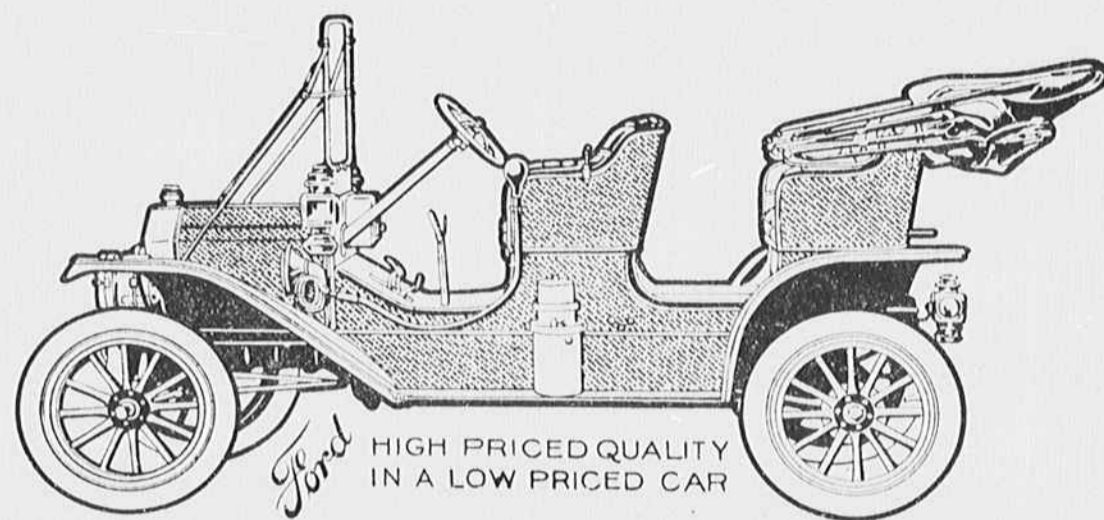
