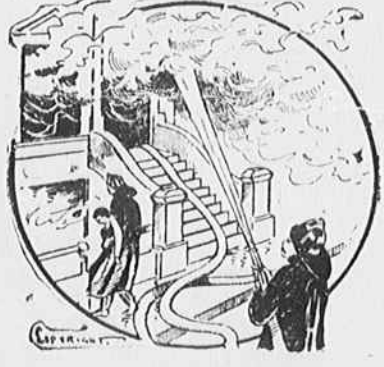

### STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION HELD.

population in the larger towns.

Cole L. Blease, of Newberry, claimed the effect of the adoption of the minority report would be to cut off white people from voting. Mr. Blease said that the benefit would be to the negroes of South Carolina. There would not be sufficient time to register all the voters, and 25,000 voters would be disqualified. On the jury question Mr. Blease said some men wouldn't register, because they didn't want to serve on the jury. G. R. Rembert took issue with Mr. Blease in the matter. He did not think the resolution would go into effect until 1912, giving all the time to prepare for the new order.

R. B. Caldwell, of Chester, called attention to the danger from votes of persons who have no interests in the welfare of the government. Upon a call for the previous question debate was ended. Senator Clifton's motion that the vote be taken by counties passed. The vote: Yeas, 210; nays, 79. The unfavorable report of the committee was therefore adopted and the resolution killed.

### Party Platform.

The Democratic convention tonight adopted the following platform, as outlined by a special committee:

"The Democrats of South Carolina, in convention assembled, express their gratifications that the signs of the times points to general dissatisfaction with the administration of the government by the Republican party, and congratulate the representative of our party in congress on the approval given their course in the recent election in Massachusetts and New York at which Republicans were defeated and Democrats sent to the congress in their places. The people of all sections are coming to realize that the Republican party stands for special privileges at the cost of the multitude, and that, through the favoritism shown to the trusts by tariff legislation, the country is now suffering from conditions which make the cost of living so high that even the Republican congress is compelled to institute an investigation.

"The only substantial and lasting relief is to be found in the adoption of the historic Democratic Doctrine demanding a system of tariff duties sufficient to raise revenues adequate to the economical administration of the government. Material reductions should be made in the tariff upon the necessities of life.

"The Protective tariff makes possible the combinations which are called trusts, and only by revision of tariff duties downward can the growth of the trusts be checked. Failure of the Republican administrations to enforce the civil and criminal laws against the trusts demonstrates anew the obligations of that party to the trusts, which render it impossible for the country to secure relief from that source. Favoring publicity of all campaign contributions, the Democratic party, throughout the country, enters upon the coming campaign for congress this fall as the only agency to which the people can turn with expectations of genuine tariff reform and genuine trust regulation.

"The Democratic party has long favored the imposition of a tax on incomes as a just method of taxation, when fairly levied and collected, and we favor such a tax. Believing, with Jefferson in the support of the State government in all their rights as the most competent administration for our domestic concerns and the surest bulwark against anti-Republican tendencies, an din the preservation of the general government in its whole constitutional vigor, as the sheet anchor of our peace at home and safety abroad. We are opposed to the centralization policies of the present National administration. We insist that Federal remedies for the regulation of interstate commerce and the prevention of private monopoly, shall be added to, not substituted for State remedies.

### Candidates' Assessments Raised.

The high cost of living has affected the State Democratic executive committee, causing assessments against candidates to be raised. The report of the sub-committee was adopted at

the meeting of the executive committee this afternoon. Senator Lide, of Orangeburg, made a motion that Congressional candidates be assessed \$75, candidates for governor \$50 and State officers \$27.50, just as had been the case heretofore, but this motion was tabled, and the new assessments adopted, as given below in the report of the committee which is as follows:

"To the chairman and members of the State Democratic executive committee of South Carolina--Gentlemen: Your committee appointed to suggest assessments and the date of opening of the campaign and the itinerary, respectfully reports that, after mature deliberation and investigation, we find that the cost of the campaign of 1908 was \$2,956, and would, therefore, suggest that the assessment on congressmen be \$125, for governor \$75 and other State officers \$50, which, from information received, would yield \$1,975, viz: seventeen candidates for congress at \$125, \$2,125; 12 candidates for State offices at \$50, \$600; 1 candidate for lieutenant governor at \$50, \$50; 4 candidates for governor at \$75, \$300, making a total of \$3,575.

"Your committee would suggest that the date for the opening of the campaign be fixed for June 22.

"We would further suggest that a committee of three, consisting of the State chairman and two members of the executive committee, to be appointed by the chairman, be appointed to make the arrangements for the itinerary.

"All of which is respectfully submitted: D. L. Sinkler, J. E. Brezanie, T. B. Crews, W. P. Robinson, L. I. Parrott, R. P. Hamer, Willie Jones, committee."
