RESUME OF PAST WEEK

South Carolina at a Glance—What is Doing in a Great State From Day to Day.

Columbia, Nov. 12.—Following the curtailment decided upon by the executive committee of the South Carolina Cotton Manufacturers' association for the month of October, practically all of the textile plants of the State have resumed operation, with the exception of a few smaller mills.

While nothing official has been announced as to the effects of the curtailment, it is generally believed that the condition of the industry has been materially improved.

There were periods of curtailment during July and October. Practically all of the mills of the State stopped operations from one to two weeks.

Edgefield, Nov. 11.—It really seems that at last Edgefield is to have a new railroad, the objective point of which will be Augusta, Ga., Edgefield, Saluda, Newberry, Whitmire and Spartanburg. There is no take about this matter, as it is a sound business affair and backed by men of means and progress.

Some months since J. William Thurmond of this place had a conference with Allen W. Jones of Midville, Ga., a man of large means and one who has before built long lines of road successfully. The conference between Mr. Thurmond and Mr. Jones took place in Augusta, Ga., and the situation was fully gone into, and it was decided to build the line of road named. Of course there are other influences behind the move, but it is not deemed prudent to name them now. It was entirely through the efforts of Mr. Thurmond that the matter was undertaken.

All necessary arrangements to secure a charter have been made, books of subscription opened and the stock subscribed. Mr. Thurmond left for Columbia this morning to secure the charter for the road, as all requirements of the law have been complied with. The name of the road will be the Georgia & Carolina railway, to cover the territory already named.

Yesterday Allen W. Jones was here and a final meeting was held and all arrangements perfected. It is to be a standard gauge, steam road. Allen W. Jones, as president and treasurer; J. Wm. Thurmond and A. E. Padgett of this place are on the board of directors, as are W. C. Hayne of Augusta, Ga., and R. C. Neely of Waynesboro, Ga.

Messrs. Thurmond and Padgett of this place are men of large means, and Mr. Hayne of Augusta is known as a bank president and a sound business man.

All indications point to a successful termination of the enterprise. So far the matter is unknown to our people and this will be the first announcement of the prospects of the road.

It is hoped that in a short time more definite announcements can be made. After Mr. Thurmond has secured the charter, work will at once be commenced on the line.

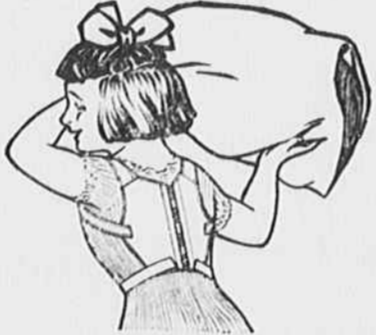

KEEN INTEREST CENTERED IN THE STAGING OF KLAW & ER- LANGER'S NEW AND GREAT- ER PRODUCTION OF "BEN HUR"

In Columbia, S. C. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday Evenings, and Wednesday Matinee, Nov. 21, 22 and 23.

Much interest has been manifested concerning the mechanical methods of the thrilling chariot race employed in Klaw & Erlanger's new and greater production of General Wallace's spectacle, "Ben Hur" which is to be presented at the Columbia Theatre, Columbia, S. C., Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings and Wednesday matinee, Nov. 21, 22 and 23.

In this great arena contest the spectator sees eight horses galloping at breakneck speed and straining every muscle to gain the advantage in the race within the amphitheatre. Behind each quartet of horses is a Roman chariot. The wheels revolve rapidly; the chariots lurch and sway and the flaming ribboned garments of the drivers flutter behind them, adding intensity to the realism of the scene. The illusion is still further increased as the interior wall of the amphitheatre moves along and the dust flies in blinding clouds beneath the crushing wheels of the chariots. The clatter of the rushing hoofs of the horses and the rattle of the chariots are distinctly heard.

Elaborate mechanism and applications of electricity produce this great effect. The mechanism of two great cradles, twenty feet in length and fourteen feet wide, and which are movable back and forth on railways, is supported by a tubular structure capable of holding twenty tons. The tops of the cradles are two inches above the level of the stage. Each cradle bears the four horses and the chariot of each contestant. On each cradle there are four runways and treadmills of hickory 3/4 of an inch wide and covered with rubber, they are twelve feet long and two and a half feet wide. On each of these treadmills a horse is secured by steel cable traces, which hold him in place and prevent him from moving forward off the runways. As each horse gallops the treadmill revolves under his feet, thereby eliminating the forward pressure created by the impact of his hoofs, which would force him ahead on an immovable surface. By this mechanical arrangement it is possible for the horse to gallop in unison with all the speed within the space of their own length. It is considered the most realistic effect ever seen upon the stage.
