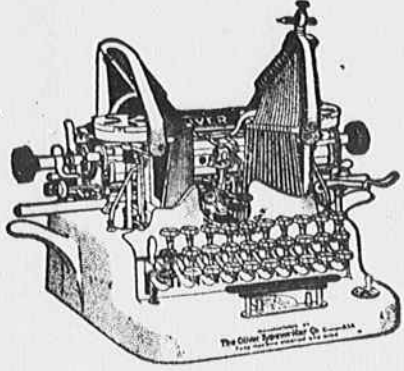

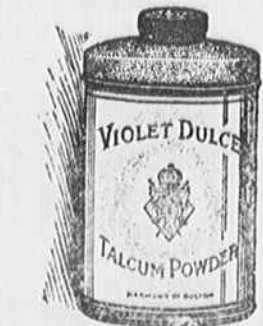

## FIFTEEN-YEAR-OLD GIRL HANGS HERSELF

Disappointment in a Love Affair is Thought to be Cause of Susie Gore's Suicide.

Lake City, Dec. 12.—Susie Gore, the 15-year-old daughter of Henry Gore, of Vineland, N. C., today between 10 and 12 o'clock deliberately took her own life by hanging herself. She went in the barn near the house of her cousin, where she had been staying for the past five months, placed a rope over the joist by standing on a barrel, then around her neck and jumped off the barrel. It is thought that she could have easily saved her own life even after she had jumped had she felt so inclined, as there was a wall near, to which she could have easily caught with her hands.

On the barrel she left a note, directed to her cousin, in which she gave instructions as to what disposition they should make of her body. She also mentioned the name of the young man with whom she had been going recently and it is supposed that she had been disappointed in a love affair. There seems to have been no other possible reason for the rash act.

Her body will be sent to her home in North Carolina tomorrow for burial.

The verdict of the coroner's jury which held an inquest over her body was that she hanged herself.—The State.

## BOY FARMERS TO WASHINGTON.

Corn Prize Winners From Eleven States to Visit Capital.

Upon invitation of Secretary of Agriculture James Wilson the eleven best growers of corn in the country, chosen from eleven different Southern States, will be his guests in Washington this week. These leaders of the nation's farmers are mere boys—the winners in corn-growing contests, which have been going on in almost every Southern State since planting time last spring. The boys, averaging from 10 to 16 years of age, will come, one each from the States of Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, and Virginia.

The contests were instituted by the farmers cooperative and demonstration bureau, of the department of agriculture, through the medium of the Byos' Corn clubs. The trips to Washington have been provided through various means. In some cases individuals have volunteered to pay the expenses of the prize-winners from their respective States. In other cases State Bankers' associations or other State organizations have agreed to defray the expenses of one boy for one week. They will then be turned over to Prof. O. B. Martin, assistant to the chief of the bureau of farmers' cooperation and demonstration, formerly of South Carolina, who will act as their guide while here.

## MONUMENT UNVEILING.

Clinton Monument Hardly Be Unveiled Before January 19th.

Clinton, Dec. 11.—The monument to the Confederate heroes, which was to have been unveiled about Thanksgiving, is not yet up but work is going forward on the foundation and it is promised for the 20 of December. The unveiling exercises will be held as soon as can be arranged for, but probably not before January 19th, Lee's birthday.

The Knights of Pythias will enjoy the most elegant banquet ever given in Clinton on Thursday night of Christmas week. The Daughters of the Confederacy will prepare it.

Twenty-five cents a week placed with the Standard Building and Loan association will carry one share of stock.

The deceased was about sixty years old, and before her marriage was a Miss Westmoreland of Greenville county. ## OUR UNIVERSITY LETTER

University of South Carolina, Dec. 12.—Dr. E. L. Green, professor of Greek in the university, addressed a large audience on last Thursday evening, subject being Pompeii. He showed many interesting pictures of the uncovered ancient ruins.

One of the features of the extension course, which has already become popular with Columbians will be a series of lectures on Italian Opera by Mrs. M. W. Twitchell, who is an expert violinist.

Dr. Wauchope, head of the department of English, has been selected by the Sumter County Teachers' association to conduct the course of study arranged by that association. Dr. Wauchope accepted and has made one trip to Sumter.

The university is continually broadening its work outside the university proper. From time to time her professors go into different parts of the State to deliver lectures, speeches, etc. on subjects of interest to people of the State.

Augustus T. Hart of Laurens was elected manager of the 1911 foot ball team at the recent meeting of the advisory board. Mr. Hart was assistant manager last year and filled the office well. This makes twice within the last three years that a man from Laurens has held this position. This speaks well for the business ability of the Laurens boys.

On Friday, December 2, the junior scholarship, the first to be awarded on merit in the history of the institution, was awarded to Mr. Augustus Hart as the best all-round man in the junior class by a unanimous vote of the faculty.

Mr. F. F. Simpson, of Laurens is business manager of the Gamecock and vice-president of the Euphradian society. Mr. Simpson is one of the best workers in college and also a great worker in society.

Class foot ball is now in full progress. J. D. Mills is coach of the Sophomore team, A. T. Hart manager of the Junior team.

All the Laurens county men are doing good work in their studies and taking an active part in all phases of college life.

Active steps are being taken toward the organization of a Laurens County club.

An interesting talk was given in the university chapel last Thursday on Navigating the Air by Mr. Post of New York, the world's greatest aviator.
