

HUNTER MUST SERVE PRISON SENTENCE

Appeal to United States Supreme Court Dismissed for Lack of Jurisdiction—Defendant Killed Elbert Copeland in 1906.

According to dispatches from Washington, the appeal case of G. Wash Hunter to the United States Supreme Court was dismissed Monday for want of jurisdiction. The appeal to the highest court in the land was made by attorneys representing Hunter after his conviction of manslaughter at Greenwood in 1908 and a sentence of eight years in the State penitentiary had been affirmed by the supreme court of South Carolina.

A motion to dismiss the appeal of Hunter was argued before the United States Supreme Court last week by Attorney General J. Fraser Lyon, and the announcement that this court had no jurisdiction in the case and had dismissed it means that Hunter will have to serve the sentence imposed by the circuit court judge before whom he was tried and convicted nearly three years ago.

This has been one of the most celebrated cases in the annals of the criminal courts of the State. In a little store house, near the railroad, almost in front of R. Lee Hunter's residence and a mile west of Goldville, a party of friends, including Wash and Lee Hunter, brothers; Elbert F. Copeland and two other young men of Clinton, met one night in July, 1906, and engaged in playing cards. As a result of dispute between Wash Hunter and Copeland, a fight ensued in which it was claimed that Copeland attempted to stab Hunter with a knife when the latter shot him dead with a pistol. In the several trials, three in the courts held at Laurens and one at Greenwood, following a change of venue in the case, Hunter pleaded self-defense. With the different trials and their results, the readers of The Advertiser are entirely familiar. The case was prosecuted in all the State courts by Solicitor Cooper, assisted by C. C. Featherstone, of Laurens and F. B. Grier of Greenwood, while the defendant was represented by W. R. Richey of the Laurens bar, C. L. Hlease of Newberry and B. F. Townsend of Union.

BENEFICIARY CANNOT COLLECT.

Sovereign Camp, W. O. W. Declines to Pay Policy on Life of Late E. A. Hamilton.

According to information received by the officers of Laurens Camp No. 98, Woodmen of the World, from the office of the sovereign camp, Omaha, Nebraska, Mrs. Della Brown Hamilton, widow of the late Mr. E. A. Hamilton, will not be paid the amount of the policy carried by her husband in the Order of the Woodmen. The policy is for \$2,000, and Mrs. Hamilton was named as the beneficiary. Because of the circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. Hamilton, it is claimed that the beneficiary cannot collect the insurance.

The proofs of death and other data were promptly forwarded to the head office, following the demise of the insured, and it was only a few days ago that notice was received to the effect that the policy had been rendered null and void by the act of the beneficiary herself.

School House Burned.

Cross Hill, Jan. 17.—The Pine Bluff school house, 2 1/2 miles from Cross Hill was burned yesterday afternoon a short while after school was dismissed. It caught between the ceiling and roof. It was insured for \$600.

Groups of silver candelabra supported green candles, the mellow light from which fell on the bridal party and enveloped them in a halo of radiance.

Preceding the ceremony Miss Maud Sumner at the pipe organ rendered several beautiful selections, Miss Margaret Parrott's song, "At Night-fall," left the packed audience hushed and expectant. Then the familiar notes of the wedding march fell on the air and every eye turned to the main door which opened to admit the bridal procession.

First entered the four little ribbon bearers, Misses Annette Todd and Nan Copeland, Pea Copeland and Nell Copeland. They wore dainty white dresses with yellow sashes and ribbons. The bridesmaids and groomsmen entered by pairs alternately, and crossing in front took positions in a semicircle. They wore soft, girlish white dresses and carried white carnations. The groomsmen were Messrs. Paul Leonard, Buist Anderson, Mason Anderson and Tom Anderson, all of Reidville. The maid of honor, Miss Harroll of Darlington wore pale blue, and carried roses. The ring was carried in by Master Lewis Hunter Fowler. The groom entered with his brother, Dr. Leland Anderson of Greenville. Mrs. John Langston, handsome in a sweeping yellow crepe gown, and carrying an armful of roses,

preceded the bride, who entered on the arm of her brother, Mr. Robt. C. Philson of Abbeville. Her wedding dress was of milky white silk of exquisite design and workmanship. for a commission to be appointed to investigate the system. A measure has been introduced in the house to cut down the appropriation of Clemson college from the fertilizer tax to \$175,000. The school is now receiving about \$240,000. This will no doubt meet with opposition in the house. A measure will be introduced asking for an increase of scholarships for Clemson college. The report of the educational commission appointed to revise the school laws has been sent to the general assembly. The report recommends a centralized school system. The State superintendent of education is given permission in a constitutional amendment to recommend the members of the State board of education to the governor for appointment. The law is otherwise progressive and yet conservative.
