THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MEMORIAL

The George Washington Memorial Association, of which Mrs. Henry F. Mimock, of New York, is president, has received \$100,000 from J. P. Morgan, a quarter of a million dollars from the City of Washington, D. C., and special donations from national societies, partly pledged, aggregating another quarter of a million. At the Annual Meeting of the Association, held in Washington, February 15, the present Board of Officers were re-elected, and plans were adopted for a remarkable nation-wide campaign to culminate in a notable celebration February 22, 1912. As a result, this country will be treated for a year to an intensely interesting campaign for the accomplishment of the great Memorial Building which the Association will erect in Washington, D. C. George Washington is to be a living personality for that time, his life and teachings and the history of his era being illuminated by methods which are bound to thoroughly popularize the movement. In the end this country will be the richer by an institution without a parallel in the world—a World Forum with the most modern facilities for assembling and disseminating the results of research along every line of human welfare.

Among the supporters of this movement are to be found the following well-known individuals and institutions: President Taft, Justice Harlan, President Hadley of Yale, President Rensselaer of Johns Hopkins, Secretary Wolcott of the Smithsonian, Dr. S. Weir Mitchell, Senator Root, General Clement A. Evans, the American Medical Association, Federations of Women's Clubs, and many others. Sons of American Revolution have given \$2,700; American Association of Advancement of Science, \$5,500; National Society for Prevention of Tuberculosis, \$900; National Society of Colonial Dames, \$8,500; Miss Isabelle Freeman, Washington, D. C., \$1,000; Mrs. Benjamin Buckingham, Washington, D. C., \$1,000; Mrs. Wm. Sage, Albany, N. Y., \$100; Frederick Peabody, Albany, N. Y., \$100; Mr. and Mrs. Paul Morton, New York, \$200; Governor Dix, Albany, N. Y., \$100; Hiram Sibley, New York, \$500; Moses Taylor Pyne, New York, \$100; Mrs. Helen Seeley, Cincinnati, \$200; Mrs. William Bliss, New York, \$200; Miss Kibbey, Washington, D. C., \$200; Edward Harkness, New York, \$500; Mrs. Frederick Thompson, New York, \$5,000; Henry Strong, Rochester, N. Y., \$500; J. Pierpont Morgan, \$100,000; J. J. Hill, \$10,000; J. B. Duke, \$5,000; George Baker,

\$2,500; Mrs. Phoebe Hearst, California, \$2,500; Mrs. Morris K. Jessup, New York, \$100; Mrs. J. J. Goodwin, New York, \$100; Mrs. Helen Jenkins, New York, \$100; John Pratt, New York, \$500; Washington Academy of Sciences and Affiliated Societies, pledged \$60,000; National Society of Colonial Dames, voted to raise, \$25,000; U. S. Daughters of 1812, voted to raise \$10,000; Masonic Lodges and other societies and individuals have given and pledged various amounts.

The above Association was incorporated in Washington, D. C., in 1898, with a view to bringing about the erection of a United States University in order to carry out Washington's wishes for the greater diffusion of knowledge in this country. About two years ago reorganization took place, and Mrs. Dimock, a sister of the late William C. Whitney, Secretary of the Navy under President Cleveland, became President. Mrs. Dimock proposed the still broader form of memorial which instantly received the highest praise in all quarters. Under her energetic guidance, the Association has laid the foundation for sure success in the splendid showing made at its Annual Meeting.

There already exists a widespread interest in this movement. In New York, subscription blanks are being displayed in public institutions of many kinds and in stores, to enable citizens and children to offer a birthday tribute to Washington by entering their names upon these lists. Ohio is to have a special room named for that State in the Memorial Building. Mrs. Joseph B. Foraker, wife of the Senator, is the Ohio State Chairman, and has interested the schools of Cincinnati in making a large subscription to the Children's Wing. Delaware also has its State branch, Mrs. Mary Bringham being State Chairman. The work there is progressing rapidly. In other States the movement is steadily gaining in popularity. Massachusetts and New Jersey being especially interested.

A Children's Wing is one of the features of the building, to be built from the ten-cent contributions of children, and devoted to their interests. The Association gives very attractive pins to contributors to wear as tokens of their part in the work. One of the distinguishing features of the movement is that it is not saddled with executive expenses. There are no administration salaries whatsoever; the officers and advisory board are high-minded persons, mostly of affluence, who are actuated wholly by motive of patriotism.

A TRAINLOAD OF FERTILIZER.

Twenty-one Cars Full Shipped to Single Firm in Greenwood Largest ever Known.

Greenwood, Feb. 19.—The largest single shipment of any commodity received by a single consignee in this State was received here Friday afternoon in the shape of a solid trainload of fertilizers, 21 cars, by Lee & Blake, a local firm. The trainload of fertilizers left Charleston, Thursday morning and was routed over the C. & W. C. The train attracted great interest all along the line. It was accompanied from Charleston by T. B. Curtis, commercial agent of the C. & W. C.; R. P. Payne, Jr., and E. H. Blake of the Read Fertilizer works, consignors. R. P. Blake and A. J. Langley of Lee & Blake met the train in Augusta and returned to Greenwood on board.
