WHAT IS BEING DONE AT THE CEMETERY

Status of the Work There and What the Owners of Lots are to Expect in the Future.

In view of the very widespread interest in Cemetery Improvement and more particularly the care and beautification of individual lots, the executive committee have deemed it proper to now inform everyone concerned, through the columns of the city press, just how the subject stands and exactly what the committee is prepared to do.

Some weeks ago a competent custodian was regularly employed to keep the gates and make himself generally useful. This man, with several others engaged for temporary service, has been at work on the terrace and in the roads and walks—a considerable portion of his time, however, being devoted to putting in order the individual squares of such lot-owners as signified their desire therefore by enrolling themselves as contributors

at a cost of three (\$3.00) dollars a year.

In every such case the square has been carefully worked over, graves mounded up where necessary, grass and weeds removed etc.; and the remarkable improvement in the interior appearance of the cemetery is largely attributable to this man's work.

It is, of course, out of the question for so nominal a charge to cover non-routine work such as trimming hedges or planting flowers or shrubbery—these items being subject to special arrangement with the committee when it is desired that such work be done by the custodian.

When all of those who have enrolled as subscribers shall have forwarded their subscriptions to the treasurer, Mrs. H. K. Aiken, the committee's finances will be in fairly satisfactory shape. This they are requested to do without delay and, while not a hint of complaint or fault-finding is intended, it can be stated as a fact that no further subscription will be solicited; nor will it be practicable for the ladies to call in person to collect subscriptions already engaged. So, as stated above, checks should in all cases be forwarded, by original and also by new subscribers, without further notice to Mrs. H. K. Aiken, treasurer. In this connection the committee wishes it known that the entire three-dollar annual fee for the maintenance fund will be very much preferred as a whole, rather than monthly payments of twenty-five cents each.

It is of more than passing interest that, even in the short time which has elapsed and notwithstanding the large amount of general work accomplished, the custodian was able to reach, before Memorial Day, and place in excellent order every one of the individual lots for the care of which the owners had paid (or promised to pay) the prescribed three dollars a year.

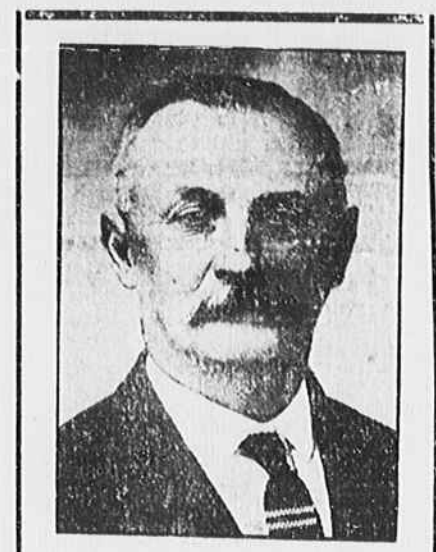
