LAURENS' PRIDE.

A little statement presented to the patrons by Supt. B. L. Jones of the Laurens City schools, entitled "Picture Fund Account" tells an interesting story of what can be accomplished with a certain amount, (very large) of intelligent effort and perseverance. This little statement tells in a nutshell the story of how the graded school building has been decorated and adorned with pictures and sculpture more extensively and with more taste than possibly any other school in the state and possibly any other school of the same size anywhere. Mr. Jones has worked with unabated perseverance whenever the opportunity offered during the past year and, as the statement shows, his work has not been in vain. The balance sheet shows that a total profit of \$701.50 was made from the lyceum course, concerts, art exhibits and in other ways during the past year. To be more exact, \$1226.98 was the gross amount taken in and \$524.49 expended, making the profit above stated.

Out of this fund Mr. Jones has supplied the school with \$67.05 worth of books, class room pictures worth over \$71, has planted trees on the grounds at an expense of nearly \$17, has bought pictures for the auditorium to the amount of \$281.13 and adorned the walls of the auditorium with friezes of great value and at a cost of \$208. While this estimation is a money valuation only, the actual value to the school as specimens of art and as a source of study cannot be reckoned.

The school building, as it now is, should be a source of much pride to the people of Laurens, for there are few which can equal it. The credit is due more to Mr. Jones than to any one else, although the teachers and pupils have given great assistance, for he it is who does the actual work in getting up and advertising the lyceum course and other attractions, entices the teachers and scholars with the desire to beautify the building and exercises such taste and originality in the selections.

It might not be out of place to state that Mr. Jones last year cleared an amount of money equal almost to half the salary which he received from the city.

OUR NEIGHBORS' HEALTH.

There has been more or less discussion of late, as the summer months are coming on, concerning the disregard, on the part of some of the property owners of the city, of the ordinance as to connection with the sewer lines. An ordinance of the city requires that wherever a houseowner has water connections he shall also have sewer connections. Of course this ordinance is intended as a health measure to aid in keeping the premises free of filth and refuse. A number of people in the city are disregarding this ordinance. It is reported on good authority, and measures should be taken at once to see that the proper connections are made. Action cannot be taken too soon in matters of this kind, for delay might mean an epidemic of fever in the city. If the owners of these properties do not take the proper precautions to protect the lives of themselves, their families and neighbors, it devolves upon the city to see that it is done. This is a very urgent matter and should be attended to at once.

According to press reports sent out from Charleston while Gov. Blease was there recently, he was quoted as saying, while sitting on the piazza of the Schutzenplatz building, that "As soon as I arrive in Columbia I shall write to Col. Griffith requesting him to shut down the mill immediately," speaking of the hosiery mill. Now another dispatch comes out of Columbia in which Gov. Blease is quoted as saying that it was his intention "to set free all prisoners disabled by chronic ill health" and in addition this dispatch says that Gov. Blease declares that at the meeting of the directors

on June 7th he would urge them "to cancel the hosiery mill contract."

Several interesting questions arise out of these statements. Did Gov. Blease write the letter to Supt. Griffith or did he change his mind after he returned to Columbia, or was he misquoted when sitting on the Schutzenplatz piazza or was he just "gassing" for the amusement of the public? It looks like somebody has slipped up.

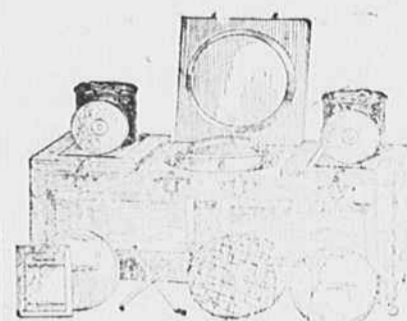
