He will laugh because he does not know what salesmanship means. It is the mere store, according to his lights. He does tomers to be enticed to his store to actually demand goods that they never thought they wanted before.

It is a comparatively easy matter to sell a woman or man goods when you have them in your store and can lay the wares right in front of them. In such a case much more than ninetenth of the selling act has already Tea and Coffee Trade Journal, New been accomplished by the coming of your customer to the store. Even then a salesman who can get big results in the store is classed as highgrade, and his salary, no matter how large, is considered a reasonable expenditure and, in many cases, cheaply

To cause a customer to have a desire to come to your store, where no desire existed before requires salesmanship of a high order. Such salesmanship makes new customers-builds your business and lays, in short, the foundation of your fortune. No retail business of modern times can make a great success without such salesmanship-without, in other words, the proper utilization of space in your local newspaper. Considering the results this kind of salesmanship obtains, it is the best and cheapest you

This efficient use of space in your local newspaper has been called salesmanship on paper. If you fill the space with forceful matter that will create attention, cause conviction and bring results, you have an addition to your sales force that may surely be called the best promoter on your staff. Field Station Has Been Established at Spartanburg.

Spartanburg, July 25-To fight the hreatened outbreak of the Southern Pine Beetle, a bark boring insect which caused enormous damage to healthy living timber in the Virginias in the early '90's and which has recently been reported in different sections of the South, a Forest Insect Field Station has been established here by the Bureau of Entomology of the United States Department of Agriculture.

It is feared that unless measures are taken for the control of this insect it will cause the loss of millions of dollars worth of pine and the station has been established here for the purpose of securing first hand information and for giving direct free instruction to timber owners on the most economical and effectual methods of controlling the beetle. The Bureau's experts have discovered methods by which the beetle can be controlled in some cases by the profitable utilization of the infected timber and in all cases at a moderate direct expense. Timber owners should communicate either with the Station here or the Bureau at Washington.
