average of just about 18 miles an hour.

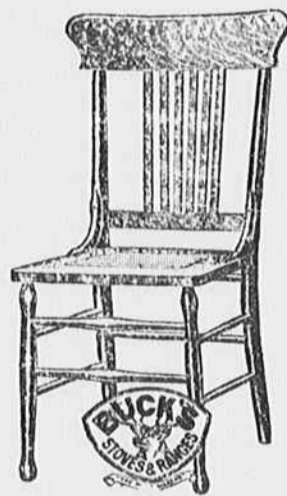
