FINAL SETTLEMENT.

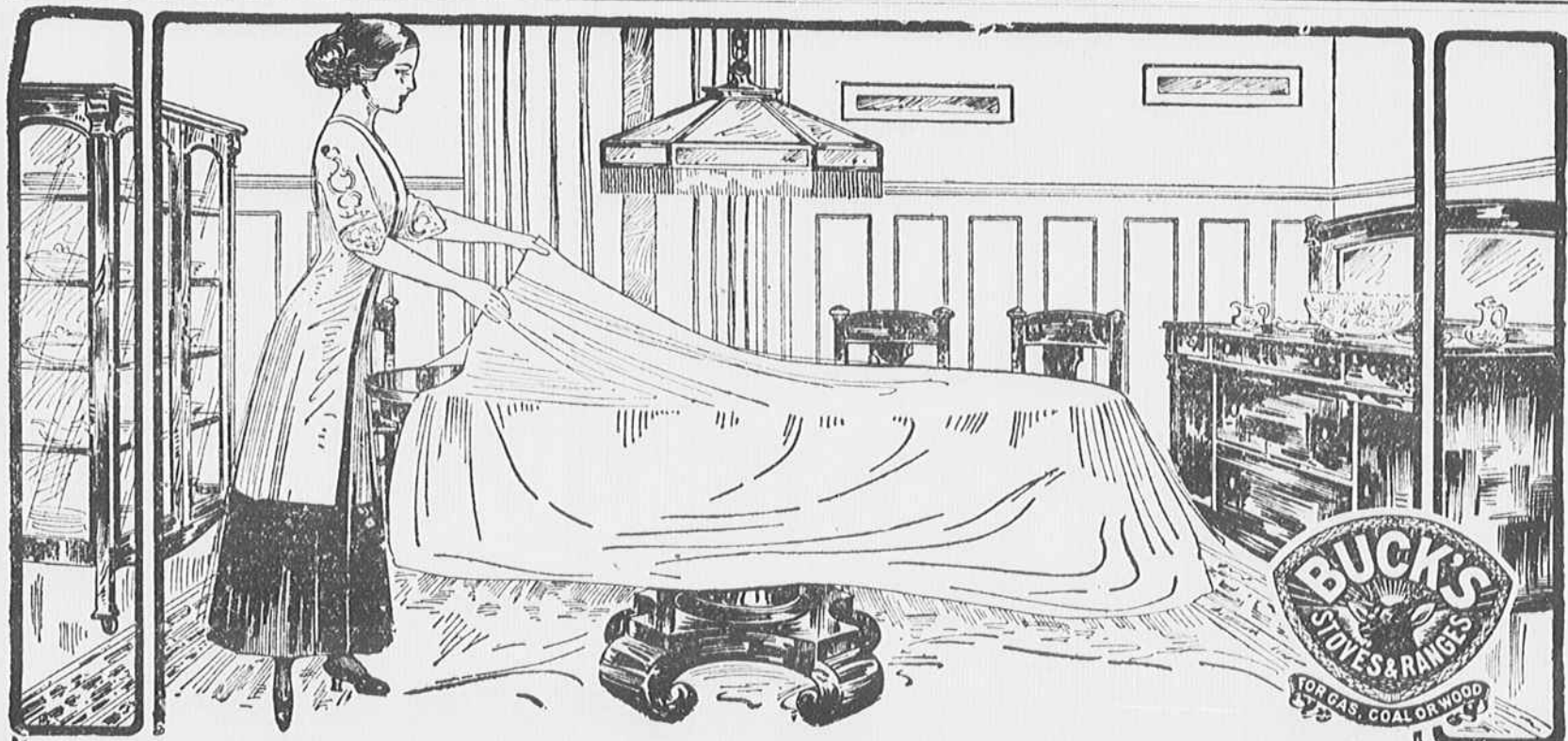
