

**GEO. R. REMBERT  
OUT FOR GOVERNOR**

**Please Floor Leader Announces that He will be in the Race. Tells Opponents to Get his Record as He has Theirs.**

Columbia, May 2.—George R. Rembert, Representative in the House from Richland county, and the titular leader of the Blease forces in that body, to-night announced his candidacy for Governor to succeed Governor Cole L. Blease. This announcement follows close on the heels of the withdrawal of Attorney General Peoples from the Gubernatorial lists.

In announcing his candidacy Mr. Rembert gave out the following statement:

**Rembert's Statement.**

"I consider it rather too soon to make a definite announcement, but my friends from all over the State have urged me to get them know what I intend to do; therefore, I will say that unless something unforeseen happens, I shall be in the race for Governor next year. I shall to the best of my ability carry forward the fight for the people that Governor Blease has made. We have differed and do differ about some things, but we have never differed in the fight for the masses of the people against the political ring, which would constitute itself into an oligarchy, dictated to by certain newspapers and a few whom they would perpetuate in office.

**For Tax Reform.**

"I shall fight as I have fought in the legislature for a reform in our tax system. We have about the most inequitable system in the United States. For years the burden has been upon the masses of the people, upon the small farmer and the merchant—upon those having tangible property alone, while the intangible property of the very rich has paid little or escaped taxation altogether. I shall fight for such changes as will lighten the burden on the shoulders of the weak, and place it where it belongs, upon the shoulders of the strong. I shall fight for a tax on water power. Millions of dollars in natural resources have been given away while the people have slept and it is time to stop.

**Would Make Newspapers Behave.**

"I shall fight as I have fought for a law that will make the newspapers behave themselves, and force them to give to every man, regardless of his politics a square deal.

"I shall fight for the election of Judges by the people. It is the only way to keep them from ultimately belonging to the corporations. The people should have as much right to say who shall construe their laws as they have to say who shall make them.

"There are other important matters which I shall incorporate in my platform, all of which will be fully discussed in the campaign.

"My political and legislative record is before the people and in possession of my opponents. If they haven't it I advise them to get it, for I have theirs."

Messrs Niles Clark and Charlton Benjamin spent Sunday with Mrs. M. O. Clark and family.

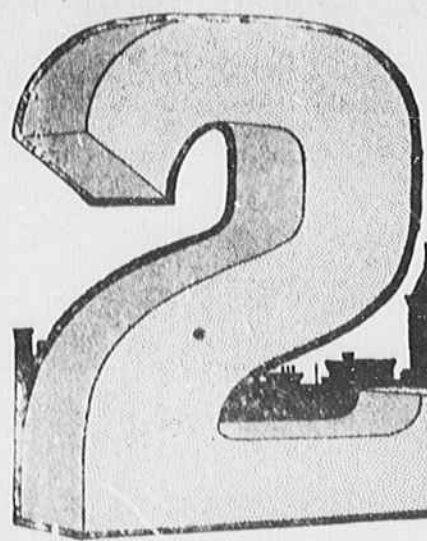

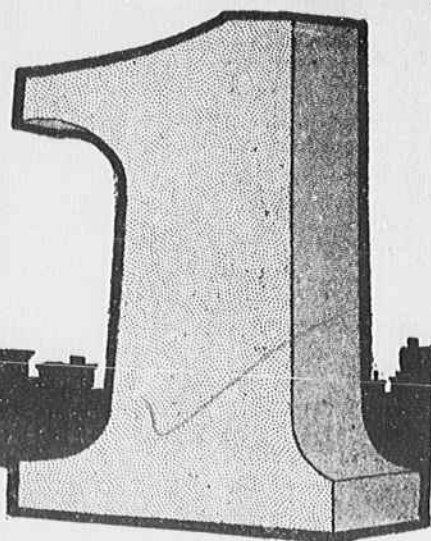

**THE HOUSE FLY.**

The past winter has been unusually mild and in consequence many flies have come through alive and are now ready for business. Remember the fly can raise only in fifth—generally in the horse stable, perhaps 95 out of every 100 come from the horse stall. It just takes ten days from the time the egg is laid to have a full grown fly which comes direct from the horse pile to your butter dish, and leaves there what he brought in with him. It may not be poisonous, and if it suits your palate, oh, well—I don't admire your taste. But it may be poisonous, for they visit other places and as they are quite social their visits are frequent. They do not wait for an invitation.

If every horse owner would have his stable cleaned out once a week and the contents scattered we would have no flies. Many deaths would be prevented and much sickness eliminated. Our citizens are dying at the rate of 17.1 per thousand and with a few precautions we could reduce it to 11 or 12 in a very short time.—Exchange.

Whereas, petitions signed by a legal number of the qualified electors and free-holders residing in Dials school district No. 6 Laurens county, South Carolina, asking for an election upon the question of voting an additional 3 mill tax upon the property in said school district to be used for school purposes, have been filed with the county board of education, an election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 10th day of May, 1913 at Barksdale school house in said district, under the management of the trustees of said school district.

Only such electors as return real or personal property for taxation and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required in the general election shall be allowed to vote.

Those favoring the 3 mill additional tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "YES" written or printed thereon. Those against the 3 mill additional tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "NO" written or printed thereon. Polls shall open at the hour of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until the hour of 4 o'clock in the afternoon when they shall be closed, and the ballots counted.

The trustees shall report the result of the election to the county auditor and county superintendent of education within ten days thereafter.
