NOTICE OF ELECTION. State of South Carolina, County of Laurens.

Whereas, petitions signed by a legal number of the qualified electors and free-holders residing in Hunter school district No. 2, Laurens county South Carolina, asking for an election upon the question of voting out of Mount-ville High School Unit No. 16, have been filed with the county board of education, an election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 5th day of July, 1913, at the school house in said district, under the management of the trustees of said school district.

Only such electors as return real or personal property for taxation and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required the general election shall be allowed to vote.

Those in favor of voting out High School unit shall vote a ballot containing the word "YES" written or printed thereon. Those against same shall vote a ballot containing the word "NO" written or printed thereon. Polls shall open at the hour of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until the hour of 4 o'clock in the afternoon when they shall be closed, and the ballots counted.


