M. Carrison, secretary of war, Thursday the latter received by the chief executive the same date, is the opinion of the military authorities in Columbia. In substance, the governor assures the secretary of war that he can be assured of his "co-operation and assistance in bringing about a compliance on the part of the National Guard of this state with the provisions of the military law as enacted by congress," which was one of the specifications as set forth in the secretary's letter.

The governor's telegram asked the secretary of war to wire orders for an encampment to begin on July 17, one week from Thursday.

The letter of Secretary Garrison, by congress.' dated in Washington, July8, is in answer to a comunication from Governor Blease under date of July 5. The communcation says that federal assistance will immediately be resumed when Governor Blease resumes proper relations with the department; that what is meant by this is that the secretary can count upon the governor's cooperation and assistance in bringing militia law as enacted by congress, about a compliance on the part of the National Guard with the military law as enacted by the congress.


