# County Treasurer

The Books of the County Treasurer will be opened for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1913, at the Treasurer's Office from October 15th. to December 31st, 1912. After December 31st, one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent. will be added till the 15th day of March, 1914, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one Township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several Townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00 except old soldiers, who are exempt at except old soldiers, who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty.
