KING AND QUEEN HONOR AMERICANS

Italian Royalty Shows Kindly Feeling. A Double Occasion.
 Rome, Nov. 29.—Hearing that it was the desire of the officers of the American battleship fleet now visiting Italian waters to pay their respects to him, King Victor Emmanuel invited the naval commanders to the Quirinal tonight. At the same time Queen Helena, who had not yet received Mrs. Thomas Nelson Page, decided to give a dinner after the reception to the wife of the American ambassador to Italy, in honor of the fleet's officers and the members of the United States embassy staff.
 Ambassador Page made the presentations. The king received Rear Admiral Cameron McR. Winslow, commander of the first division of the Atlantic fleet; Rear Admiral Frank E. Beatty, commander of the fourth division; Capt. William J. Maxwell, commanding the battleship Florida; Capt. R. C. Smith, commanding the Arkansas; Lieut. Commander Earl P. Jessop of the Arkansas; Commander Frank Lyon of the battleship Kansas; Lieut. Commander Arthur B. Keating of the Arkansas; Lieut. William Norris of the Florida; Lieut. John Downs, Jr., aide on the staff of Rear Admiral Beatty; Lieut. William W. Gallbraith of the Connecticut and Lieut. Rufus F. Zogbarn, of the Arkansas.
 His majesty declared he was a great admirer of the splendid American navy and said he was delighted to shake hands with the officers of the fleet.
 Queen Helena's dinner, which Ambassador and Mrs. Page attended, was served immediately after the king's audience. In addition to the American officers the guests included prominent court officials, the ladies and gentlemen in waiting and diplomatic attaches.
 In proceeding to the banquet hall Ambassador Page, with Queen Helena on his arm, led the way. They were followed by King Victor Emmanuel, who escorted the Princess Kirko of Montenegro. After the dinner the king and queen bade farewell to the American officers and wished them good luck.

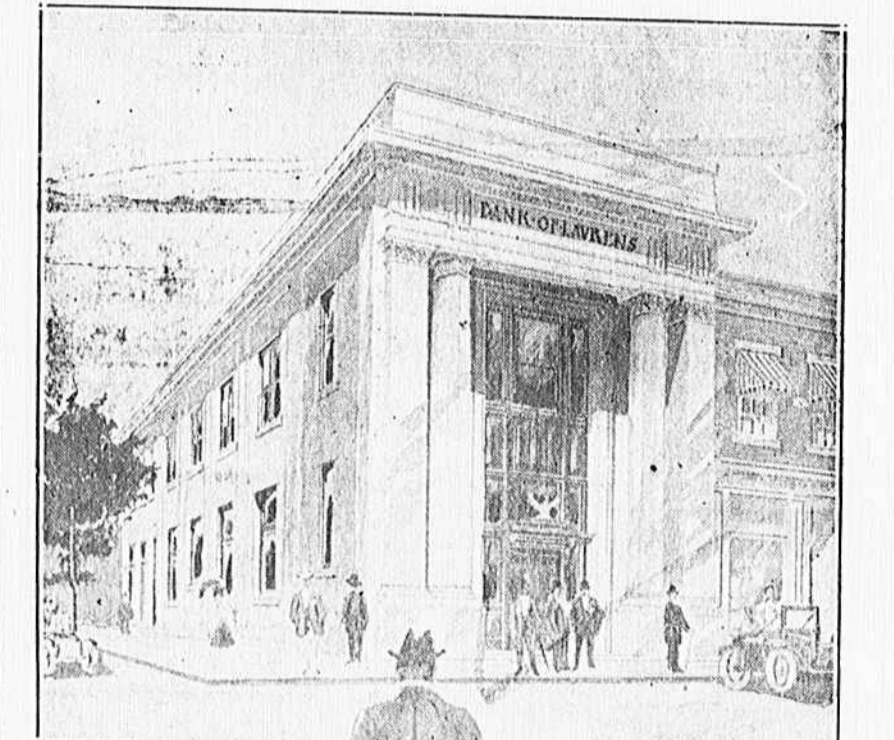
