The Books of the County Treasurer will be opened for the collection of State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1913, at the Treasurer's Office from October 15th. to December 31st, 1912. After December 31st, one per cent will be added After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th, seven per cent. will be added till the 15th day of March, 1914, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one Township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several Townships in which the property is located. This is important, as addition al cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens be-tween the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00 except old soldiers, who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty.

#### LAURENS COTTON CROP BETTER THAN LAST

Increase of Over Six Thousand Bales in Ginnings up to December Twen-

According to the corrected totals of cotton ginnings for the term ending December 20th, the cotton crop for this county is 6,256 bales larger than for the same term last year. The total ginnings to December 20th this year or five years. have been 40,213 bales, as against 33,-957 bales last year. The total number the same time this year was 1,277,641

as against 1,129,850 last year. The following are the totals for the entire state, a study of which will show that the northern and western counties have shown the largest increases in production, while there has been a falling off in the north-eastern counties of the state, viz., Chester, Chesterfield, Darlington, Dillon, Fairfield, Lancaster, Marion, Marlboro and York: -Crop-

Mr. Ferguson owned a large farm in the Capers Chapel neighborhood, and was prominently connected.

His body will not be interred until Sunday, awaiting the arrival of relatives from Florida.

BOLL WEEVIL IN FEW YEARS.

lemson College Exports Predict that the Little Enemies of the Southern Farmer will be here in Four or Five

According to the report on boll weevil quarantine prepared by Clemson college for the legislature, the pest will reach South Carolina in four

"The territory that lies between South Carolina," says the report, "and of bales ginned in the entire state for the boll weevil section is rapidly growing less. The weevil has much more than regained his setback of two years ago. It is only a matter of four or five years when this pest will reach South Carolina in spit of anything that we can do. The average rainfall of South Carolina is equal to that of Texas during its worst weevil years. It is true that good cotton crops were made in the northern half of the weevil belt, but it is well to regard this condition with reserve. There have been a series of seasons adverse to weevil propogation. When it reaches this State there will be a severe reaction in our agricultural practices, and it will require a few years for matters to readjust themselves. It is our purpose to use every precaution to keep out the weevil until it reaches us by natural distribution. For this reason the rules and regulations were revised so as to entirely prohibit the importation of cotton seed for any purpose whatsoever. Our methods of fumigation, though very effective and of great practical value, apparently are not absolutely safe, especially when op-

erating in large quantities of seed.

"The most serious violation of the boll weevil quarantine regulations occurred in Marlboro county. A report was brought to the attention of the crop pest commission from a number of sources almost simultaneously that a carload of cotton seed from weevil territory had arrived at Bennettsville, The shipment was found and immediately quarantine, fumigated and such other precautions taken to make it reasonably harmless until a thorough investigation could be completed. The investigation showed that the shipment contained 436 sacks of Allen long staple cotton seed grown at Port Gibson, Miss., and shipped by S. Bernheimer & Son, Port Gibson, to A. M. Matheson, Bennettsville. The car was routed over the Y. & M. railroad, Port Gibson to Memphis; Frisco railroad, Memphis to Birminghom, and via the Atlantic Coast Line railroad to Bennettsville. It was explained that the detour was made to reduce the freight rate. A portion of the seed had been delivered to different parties in the county. 
