TO SEGREGATE RACES.

Bill Passed by .Recent .Legislatur Went into Effect Monday Morning.

The bill passed by the recent legis lature compelling the segregation of races in the textile mills of the state has been signed by Gov. Manning and went into effect Monday morning. It is understood that the law affected negroes in the local mills employed in cleaning looms and sweeping the floors. These were given their discharge Monday. The law is as fol-

"Section 1. "Section. 3. This act shall not apply to employment of firemen as subordi nates in boiler rooms or to floor the swindler claimed to be a member scrubbers and those persons employed of the staff of The Manufacturers in keeping in proper condition lavatories and toilets, and carpenters, mechanics and others engaged in the repair or erection of buildings.

WHAT MAY HAPPEN IF GERMANY WINS

David Lloyd-George Says if England Loses Teuton Would be World Dictator.

Bangor, Wales, February 28 .- The chancellor of the exchequer, David Lloyd-George, made a pointed reference to the United States in a speech here today.

"If Germany is triumphant over this country," he said, "she would be practically dictator of the world. And where," he said, "could we then look to a chivalrous country to protect us -to - America?

"If countries like France an Russia. with huge armies, and we, with the most powerful navy in the world, could not face this terrible machine, how could America step in? It would be more than America could do to defend her interests in her own continent. America is more unready than we were."

The chancelolr then took up liquor and industrial questions.

"The government has wide powers to deal with the drink question, and it means to use them," delared the chancellor of the exchequer. He said a small minority of the workmen in the armament factories had refused to work a full week because of the lure of drink.

The government would use its pow ers discreetly and in a spirit of moderation, Lloyd-George asserted, but "fearlessly." He was sure the public would support whatever action was Sold in Laurens and recommended as taken and allowed no indulgence to interfere with the country's prospects in the war.

"The war," he said, "is to be won or lost by the engineers. We need men, but we need arms more than men, and every day of delay is full of peril to the country. For one reason or another we do not get the assistance we have a right to expect from our workshops. Industrial differences are inevitable, but we cannot afford them

"It is intolerable that the lives of Britons should be imperilled for the sake of a farthing an hour. During war governments should have the power of settling difficulties so that worl more money the government should give it. I do not believe the parties involved will refuse to comply with the urgent ommand of the government that there should be no delay."

Expressing confidence in the out come of the war the chancellor said the people of the country hardly real ized yet the importance of the strug gle in which they were engaged and warned them that victory could not be won without a long struggle. He declared that while England had enrolled the largest volunteer army ev er gathered in any country or in any century, it ought to be larger still.


