INCOME TAX NOTICE.

Columbia, March 13, 1915. Mr. J. W. Thompson, County Auditor, Laurens, S. C.

Dear Sir: The State Tax Commission of the State of South Carolina has sent me the following communication relative to the enforcement of the Income Tax Law: "The time for making returns under the income tax law of this state expired on the 20th of February last, and a very large number of persons liable to the payment of the tax omitted to make such returns within the time limited. The neglect to make the returns in time may have been caused in part by an erroneous impression that the returns and payment of the income tax to the Federal Government relieved these taxpayers from paying the income tax imposed by laws of this State. The failure to make returns within time have been so general and widespread that we think further opportunity should be allowed such persons to make these returns before the penalties provided by law are imposed upon them. In order, therefore, to save such persons who will now come forward and make the proper returns, I, Carlton W. Sawyer, under and by virtue of power conferred upon the Comptroller General, with the approval of the Governor, in Section 767 of Volume 1, Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1912, do hereby extend the time for the making of returns and assessment of income taxes without penalty until the first day of July, A. D. 1915. You will govern yourself accordingly.
