### The Cost of Fishing.

Editor Laurens Advertiser: I am sending you a statement of what it cost Webb Elledge and Courtney White to catch fish at this place. White gets his over the trap line and Elledge gets his by way of the basket route.

So on the first day of January White bought five dollars' worth of lumber and made him a trap and put it in the river and it is four hundred yards from the house. He goes to it six times a day. Well, from the first day of January to the first day of April he walked two hundred and ninety-four thousand yards, which is two hundred and eighty-six miles, six hundred and forty yards and he has knocked off three toe nails, fallen in the river seven times, worn out three pair of shoes, taken twelve dollars worth of cough syrup and caught fifteen pounds of fish.

Mr. Elledge put his baskets in the river at the same time and at a place known as the "McNinch Rock" just one mile from the power house. He went to them every day. So, from the first day of January to the first day of April he walked one hundred and eighty miles, bought four bushels meal and one bushel of onions for bait which cost him six dollars, paid one dollar and fifty cents for the baskets. Wore out three pairs of shoes, tore a very large hole in the most important part of a five dollar pair of pants, fell in the river three times, and caught six pounds of fish. So he has cut his baskets loose and if the waters of Saluda river carries them where he told them to go and there is any fish in them when they get there they will fry quick. He has decided that the best way to get fish is to buy mullets.

But White has the patience of Job. He still goes to his trap six times a day, and is trying to buy lumber to make him another one.

### Leland Archibald Langston.

In the death, last Saturday, of Leland Archibald Langston, Darlington lost a man who had performed valiant service for its people, even to the point of facing death itself that they might enjoy peace and liberty. Confined to his bed for twenty-two weary months by paralysis and softening of the brain, death at last came as a welcome surcease to his patient suffering.

With an honorable record as chief of police for nineteen years at Laurens, Mr. Langston came to Darlington in 1901, and succeeded Chief Dargan upon the latter's death. Owing to ill health, he was compelled to resign in 1911, and since that time had seen few well days.

As Chief of Police, Mr. Langston was capable and efficient; a man of high integrity, honorable and faithful in his every act. He was always self-possessed, and was considerate of his fellowmen. As an officer of the law, he was noted for his courage and devotion to duty. He was no respecter of persons; in his eye, an offender was an offender, let his station be what it might.

Old residents recall one instance, in particular, in which he displayed rare courage in making an arrest. One Brock, employed on the cement work around the courthouse, became incensed at a superior, and procuring a pistol, shot the latter in the jaw. The injured man fled, with Brock in pursuit. Beside himself with rage because his victim had escaped him, Brock reloaded his pistol and, standing in the Public Square, defied any man to approach him. Chief Langston was soon on the scene, cool and unarmed. His friends begged him not to attempt to arrest the enraged man, who was brandishing his loaded weapon, but the chief saw only his duty. He calmly walked up to Brock, disarmed him, and placed him under arrest.

This was not the only instance in which Chief Langston had displayed his courage. He came to Darlington with an enviable record for bravery at Laurens. Old residents associate several widely-known incidents with Mr. Langston's official career previous to his coming to Darlington.—Editorial in Darlington News and Press.

### ARCHIMEDES AND HIS LEVER.

The Feat of Raising the Earth From a Scientific Viewpoint.

"Give me a fulcrum and a place on which to stand and I will raise the earth from its place!" That is a saying popularly attributed to Archimedes. If the required conditions were possible the feat might be performed, but in addition to providing a fulcrum and a place on which to stand Archimedes would also have to be furnished an indefinite lease of life.

To raise the earth a height of one inch by the force which Archimedes would have been capable of exerting would take not only an extremely long lever, but an extremely long time, as can be readily shown.

We shall assume the following data in our calculation: That the earth is a sphere 7,926 miles in diameter and that 5.5 is its mean density; also that the lever has no weight. Should we design a real lever it would be of such enormous size and weight that Archimedes' weight would be a negligible quantity.

If the earth is 7,926 miles in diameter the volume is about 261,300,000,000 cubic miles, or 38,400,000,000,000,000,000 cubic feet, and if the density is 5.5 the weight per cubic foot would be about 344 pounds, which multiplied by the volume would give as the weight of the earth 13,209,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 pounds. We shall assume, further, that Archimedes weighed 150 pounds and that "the place on which to stand" was some distant star; then, if the fulcrum is one mile from the point of application of the lever to the earth the length of the power arm of the lever, or the distance of Archimedes' "standing place," would have to be 88,064,000,000,000,000,000,000 miles.

To move the earth a distance of one inch Archimedes' end of the lever would have to move through a distance of 1,388,000,000,000,000,000 miles. Now, if Archimedes should take hold of the end of the lever and apply his weight of 150 pounds to it and should move off into space with the velocity of light, or 186,000 miles a second, it would take him 237,000 years to finish the job he proposed, so that now, nearly 2,200 years after making the famous dictum, he would barely have started the undertaking.—C. O. Sandstrom in Scientific American.

### Unnecessary Alarm.

When Frederick the Great, at the beginning of the Seven Years' war, was in possession of Dresden he went to view the works of art in the royal picture gallery. The gallery director, Reidel, took the king through all the rooms and explained each picture as they went along. Frederick expressed his unreserved admiration for all the pictures, but when he came before a certain painting by Correggio he stopped, viewing it with particular interest.

"If you are willing," he said suddenly, "I should like to have that picture!"

Reidel gasped, for he expected the king to say that he wished the picture for himself. But the king noticed his anxiety and, striking him on the shoulder, said, laughing: "If you are willing I should like to have that picture copied!"—Youth's Companion.

### Bore and Caliber.

The bore of a shotgun is determined by the circumference of any one of a given number of lead balls of equal weight, the total weight of which is one pound. For instance, the circumference of the barrel of a ten bore shotgun is equal to the circumference of any one of ten lead balls of equal weight the total weight of which is one pound.

The caliber of a rifle is the diameter of the bore of its barrel measured in hundredths of an inch. The diameter of the bore of a .32 caliber rifle is thirty-two hundredths of an inch.—Philadelphia Press.

### A Musical Tyrant.

Gluck as a conductor is said to have been an unmerciful tyrant. Frequently the musicians would have to repeat a passage twenty times before he was satisfied. The members of the Vienna court orchestra complained of this hard usage to the emperor, Joseph II, who appeased them by agreeing to give them 2 ducats instead of 1 ducat for every performance at which Gluck should conduct.

### A Prophetic Writer.

In practical science the most marvelously prophetic writer was the Marquis of Worcester, who in his "Century of Inventions," published in 1633, described the steam engine, the telegraph, the torpedo, the range finder, the hydraulic press, portable military pontoons, matches and many other things which have come into use within the last hundred years.—St. James' Gazette.

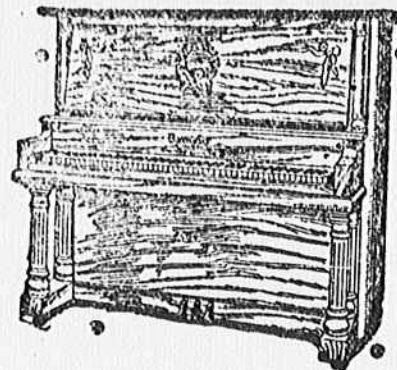

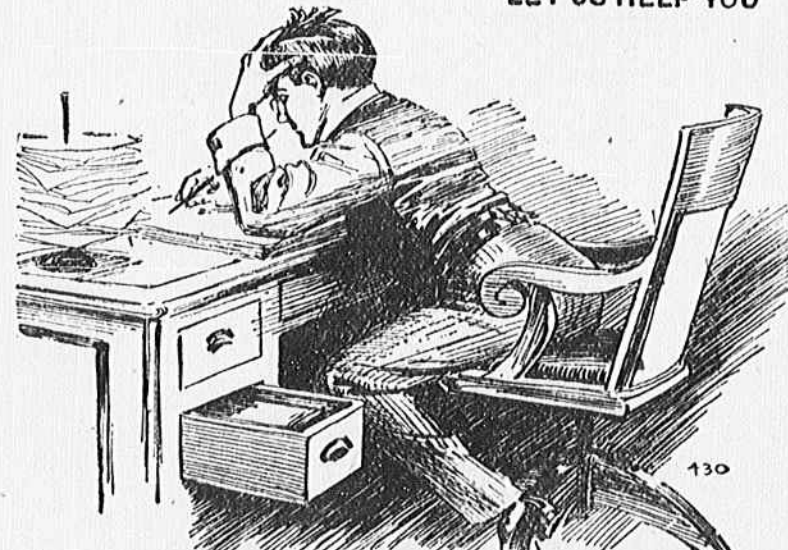
