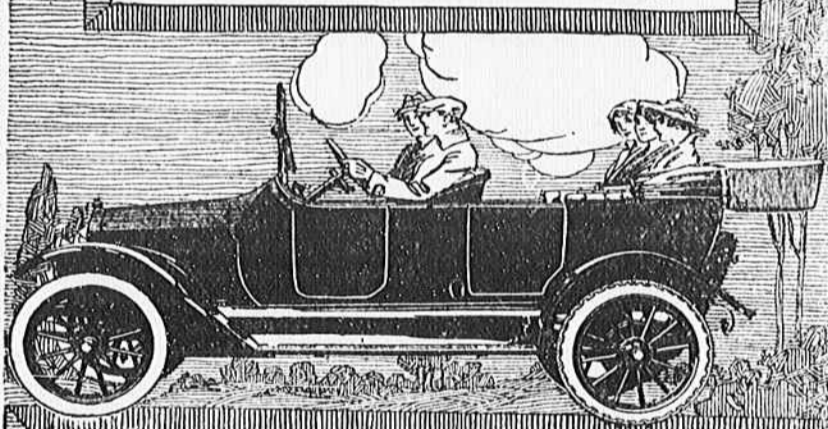

"ONE BALE AN ACRE."

How to Make Cotton Growing a Profitable Business.

To the Editor of The News and Courier: Kindly allow space for publication of this article, in which is set forth a desire to launch a constructive movement for the future prosperity of the South. The figures used are illustrative, to demonstrate the general proposition, and are not given to invite controversy, although they are near enough to accuracy, when a general average is taken, to be passed as correct.

The cotton crop has not proved a paying business for the South, and has been a losing game to a majority of the cotton planters. It is not because, generally, the planter has sold his cotton before the price goes up; nor will large crops at low prices or small crops at high prices; or increased yields with increased amount of fertilizer, remedy the evil; but the simple application of a simple business principle. I believe that statistics will show that, taking a 10-year average; for the whole cotton belt, it has required three acres of land to produce one 500-pound bale of cotton. The same 10-year average will probably show that cotton brought 10 cents the pound or \$50 the bale. Even if the cotton planter got \$50 for each 500-pound bale, taken as a whole the planter lost money, probably in every State, except those few where, I am told no commercial fertilizers are used. By the appended figures you will see that it costs around \$26 to produce and place upon the market one 500-pound bale of cotton, if made upon one acre of land, under normal conditions; and about \$39 when made upon two acres and about \$52 when made upon three acres. Consequently any profit derived could only have come from the sale of the seed.

The one-bale-an-acre movement is designed to make the cotton crop a paying business for the cotton planter, and there is no reason why it should interfere with diversified farming, intensified farming or any other movement for the betterment of the farmer. Practically every farmer in the cotton belt has some land that will under normal conditions, produce one 500-pound bale of cotton on a selected acre. Some may have one, three, ten or fifty and so on according to the number of acres of farming land he owns or rents. Were it possible this year to get each farmer to select such land, and plant it, and no other land in cotton, and weather and other conditions should be normal, the probable crop of 10,000,000 bales could be produced upon 10,000,000 acres which are going to be sacrificed in producing the possible 10,000,000 bales could be planted in forage or other crops. (I assume that the reduction in cotton acreage this year will be not less than 25 per cent. In 1914 there were some 35,000,000 acres planted in cotton, and this year with lack of money, supplies and fertilizer, I judge there will not be more than 27,000,000 acres planted in cotton, and with a probable cut of more than 50 per cent in fertilizer used, I figure that under the most favorable weather conditions 10,000,000 bales will be the outside mark because there will be no discretion used in selecting land upon which to plant cotton.)

I want the press of the South; the various agricultural societies; the agricultural departments of the cotton States; the agricultural colleges; the farm demonstration agents and, in fact, every one who is interested in the prosperity of the South, to assist in pushing the movement forward. Simply show the cotton planter that by selecting the land, which he already knows will produce one 500-pound bale on an acre, under normal conditions, and planting only such land in cotton, that he can make money. Show him that if, in a tract of 30 acres, which he now plants and makes, say 12 bales upon, he has five acres that will each make a 500-pound bale, it will pay him better to plant only the five acres in cotton and use the rest for other crops, until such time as it too can be brought up to a state where it will produce a 500-pound bale an acre. I shall endeavor to get the agricultural committees of the various bankers' associations to assist in the movement.

If my idea is not clearly put, please let me state that in a few words, it means simply that by selection of land to plant in cotton, the acreage can be reduced two-thirds and the crop not reduced. That the cost of production and marketing a bale of cotton can be reduced from \$52 to \$26. It means that the South can have 20,000,000 acres now wasted in cotton planting to use for other purposes, and that the number of bales of cotton produced will be the same.

INJURIES PROVE FATAL.

J. W. Monroe Dies at Camden Hospital
Camden, April 24.—J. W. Monroe, manager of the Pine Creek cotton mill of the Parker merger, who was mangled on Friday afternoon by the Southern train while he was attempting to cross the track at Sixteenth street, died last night at 11:30 o'clock at the Camden hospital. The accident has cast gloom over the town, for he has made many friends during his few months' stay in Camden, coming here from Greenville last January. He was a member of a prominent New Orleans family, where his father is a judge of the circuit court. His mother and sister came to visit him about ten days ago and were with him when he died. An inquest was held this afternoon. A brother from New Orleans is expected tonight, and another brother from the North will be here tomorrow. The remains will be carried to New Orleans for burial.

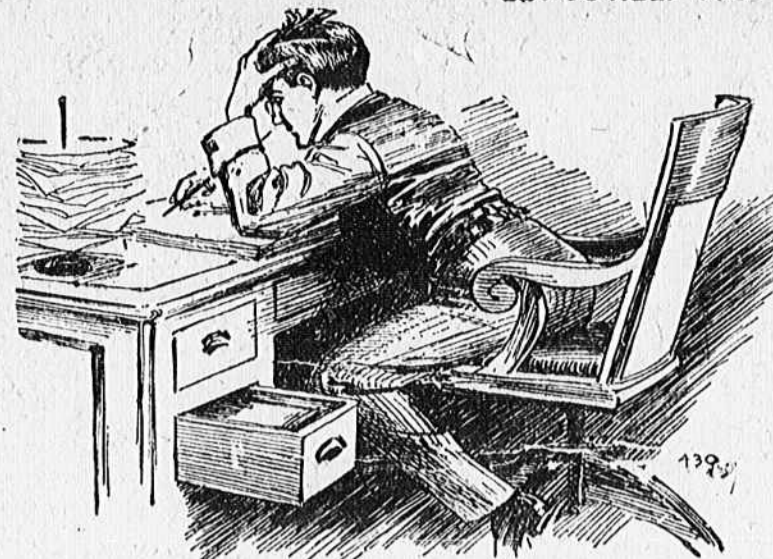
VON TIRPITZ HONORED.

Admiral Decorated by German Emperor.
Amsterdam, April 25 (via London).—Dispatches from Berlin say that Emperor William yesterday sent the following telegram to Admiral von Tirpitz, minister of marine and admiral of the fleet:
"On today's 50th anniversary of your entering the naval service I express to you my heartiest congratulations, also my pleasure, that with God's help it was granted you to celebrate this day still in active service and full vigor. I embrace this opportunity to assure you of my warmest gratitude for your great services rendered to the fatherland by the successful extension of the navy. With justified pride you can look today on this, your life work, the importance of which the present war has strikingly shown.
"As a sign of my gratitude I confer on you the Grand Commander of the Royal House, Order of the House of Hohenzollern."
