

CHARLESTON MAYOR WRITES

Gives List of Places that have been Raided Since Law Enforcement Campaign Began.

Columbia, May 6.—Nearly 6,000 bottles of beer have been seized by the Charleston police since the law enforcement campaign was begun, according to reports filed by Mayor John P. Grace with Gov. Manning. The Charleston mayor forwarded the reports of James R. Cantwell, chief of police, without comment. Gov. Manning refused to discuss the report by the Charleston mayor.

The following reports have been transmitted by Mayor Grace of Charleston to Gov. Manning:

"Charleston, S. C., April 26, 1915. Hon. John P. Grace, Mayor, City.

"Dear Sir: In reply to your request for the record of this department in complying with your order for the enforcement of the law, I beg to advise that three squads and detective department assigned to enforce same have made 849 raids, confiscating and delivering to the county dispensary the following wines, liquors, etc.: 5,664 bottles of beer, 779 half pints of whiskey, 310 quarts of whiskey, 5 quarts of wine, 6 gallons whiskey and one-half barrel wine, containing 27 gallons. In addition to this, 66 kegs of beer were confiscated and emptied in the sewer, 60 were seized and demolished and all gambling has been suppressed, 43 places have discontinued the illicit sale and all other have been driven to cover and now resort to the hip pocket practice and only keep sufficient stuff on the premises to supply the immediate demands. They replenish their stock from private residences in the locality under cover, but by continually raiding them they will eventually have to go out of business. This department has conscientiously enforced the law and will continue to do so, even though it overtaxes the department by drafting men from the line of protection to the public in its endeavors to enforce the law. Therefore, I will respectfully request the appointment of five additional men. Trusting you will approve of same, I am,

The next time Abbeville has the pleasure of having the Field Day Exercises, some arrangement should be made so that everybody would have a chance to take a look at the handsome young men who drive the "Tin-Pan-Nancys." There was no place for them to perform last Friday except the public square, and in order to be sure that they were "seen" it was necessary for several of the prettiest boys in the crowd to drive around seventeen or eighteen times. Even at that, they could not drive with any satisfaction to themselves; somebody was always getting in the way, making it necessary to blow the horn, and thus attracting attention.

Another inconvenience which they experienced was that they had to sit upright in the seat in order to keep from driving over someone. Now, a young gentleman who wishes to show the public some "stunts" in gliding in one of these "means of transportation" cannot get the right effect unless he sticks his knees about eighteen inches above his head, and sits on his shoulder blades. He should also have on a white cloth hat (silk preferred) shaped towards the top like a funnel;

STANDS STRAIN WELL.

Aged Francis Joseph in Good Health.

Vienna, April 25.—Correspondence of the Associated Press.—Notwithstanding the labor and ceaseless anxieties caused by the war, Emperor Francis Joseph is said to be in better health and physical condition than for years past. He has gone through a trying winter without the least trace of a cough or cold, and his activity and enormous capacity for work astonish his ministers and others brought in contact with him.

Rising every morning very soon after 4 o'clock, the monarch, now in his 85th year, devotes practically the entire day to the affairs of state; examining and signing papers, or receiving high military officers who bring him the latest and fullest news from the seat of war, and cabinet ministers coming for instructions on matters of foreign or domestic policy. The intervals for rest during the day are very short. Only meals and a walk in the private garden adjoining his apartments in the castle of Schoenbrunn will draw the emperor from his desk. His appetite is excellent and for the first time in some years he is showing an interest in the menu and frequently orders special dishes.

Much to his disappointment the court physician has ordered him to stop his visits to the wounded soldiers in the Vienna hospitals. But there was always the danger of the venerable ruler getting into a draught or being overtaken by a shower and so it was deemed best to confine his outdoor goings to walking in the Kammergarten.
