USE FRENCH MACHINES.

Germans Seize Factories in Occupied Regions.

PARIS, June 25.—More than 15,000,000 of the 16,500,000 tons of iron ore produced annually in France, worth about 67,000,000 francs, comes from the department of the Meurthe and Moselle, occupied by the Germans. Three and a half million of the 4,500,000 tons of pig iron produced in France annually also comes from those regions, and 2,250,000 of the 3,500,000 tons annual production of steel. Seventy-four per cent of the French iron industries, therefore, are immobilized.

A great deal of the information concerning the fate of French industries behind the German lines is anonymous. Privately, however, the report that every machine that can be utilized in Germany has been taken, as well as all the money and products of the occupied regions, has been verified by reliable manufacturers who have means of communication that they are careful not to reveal. The usual German system was applied to the distribution of the machines. A stock company of German manufacturers managed this part of the economic war. This company sent engineers to Belgium and northern France to select such machines as might be worth taking. These were shipped to Cologne and a complete catalogue was printed and sent to German manufacturers, offering them at prices ranging from 50 per cent of their value up. In this way German factories making shells for the army were able to increase their battle equipment on good terms. The stock company took 15 per cent commission on the sale and the real owner received a requisition payable sometimes by the Reichsbank, more often by the Bank of France—six months after the conclusion of the war. The requisition price is generally based on the cost price, less depreciation of 10 per cent a year, with a minimum value of 50 per cent.

NATIONS' SEA LOSSES.

Unimportant but Expensive Naval Skirmishes.

Liverpool, June 20.—After ten months of war the losses suffered by the contending navies present some interesting points for speculation, says The Journal of Commerce, affording a comparison of the relative merits of the various offensive weapons in the naval struggle, and showing how costly it is to the countries concerned to indulge in minor encounters.

Summarizing the losses under types of vessels, Great Britain and her allies have been deprived of the services of eight battleships, 14 cruisers, four gunboats, six destroyers, ten submarines, 14 boats, and six armed merchantmen and auxiliaries.

The losses of Germany and her allies consist of one battleship, 23 cruisers, 15 gunboats, 13 torpedo craft, six submarines and 20 armed merchantmen and auxiliaries.

Separating the losses under the various causes, neglecting auxiliaries and armed merchantmen, the torpedo has destroyed 131,000 tons of allied vessels, the mine 50,000 tons, gunfire 27,000 tons and 22,000 tons have been lost in various other ways.

The German, Austrian and Turkish fleets have been deprived of 13,000 tons of war vessels by means of the torpedo, 23,000 tons of the mine, \$1,600 tons by gunfire, and 23,000 tons from various other causes.

These figures show that England and her allies have lost 230,000 tons of naval fighting material costing approximately \$100,000,000, while the Tenton and Turkish losses total 140,000 tons, worth about \$60,000,000.

The figures also show that the miscellaneous losses officially recorded are approximately the same on both sides, while from torpedo, gun and mine the British and their allies have lost nearly double the tonnage that their opponents have lost by the same causes. By torpedo the British losses are ten times more than those of the other side which shows clearly how important a part that weapon plays.

In gunfire England has established a long lead chiefly because the German ships at large when war was declared have been destroyed by this means. In the armed merchantment and auxiliary class the net register tonnage of allied ships destroyed amounts to 30,000, while the German, Austrian and Turkish losses stand at approximately double that figure. The total financial loss in this instance amounts to about \$15,000,000.

Thus ten months of skirmishing and preliminary actions, leading to no definite results so far as the question of naval supremacy is concerned, has brought about the destruction of about 460,000 tons of warships costing \$175,000,000.

Statue to Gen. Green.

Greensboro, N. C., July 3.—More than 10,000 people attended the unveiling today of an equestrian statue of General Nathaniel Greene on the Guilford court house battlefield near this place. The statue was erected by the United States government at a cost of \$30,000 and is located in the southeast corner of the famous spot where General Greene commanded the Continental troops.
