Manufacture Shows Increased Activity Over Same Period Last Year, Washington, July 14 .-- Cotton man-

ACTIVITY IN COTTON

North Colored and Colored and

facture showed increased activity in June, taking 68,655 more bales of cotton than in June last year, and 17,000 bales more than in May last the total being 14,900 bales, the census bureau announced today.

During the 11 month period ending with June, however, cotton manufacture was 77,000 bales less than in the corresponding period a year ago. In all, 5,100,322 bales were used against 5,177,745 in 1914.

Exports during June were only 1,187 bales less than in June last year, notwithstanding the effect of the European war. In the 11 months the exports were only 753,288 bales less than the previolus year, the total reaching ducted tomorrow morning at eleven [8,271,302 bales against 9,024,590 last
