The trustees, themselves, or most of them, are already alive to the needs as well as the possibilities of education and their presence, while having a salutary effect, is not near so important as the presence of those who need to be convinced that the county's educational facilities should be constantly improved. Every trustee should make it a point to encourage his neighbors and friends to be present.

PREPARATION NEEDED. With all the diplomatic verbiage boiled down to a plain statement, it appears that the United States now occupies about this position with regard to Germany: The United States has already made allowances for the extraordinary conditions prevailing in such an unprecedented war by allowing the murder of Americans on board the Lusitania and other ships to go unavenged. But the stress of time and circumstances has passed and any future act of the warring nations will be considered in the light of the acts as they are committed. Hence, any violation of international law in the future will be taken as such and if the interests or lives of Americans are thereby endangered, this government will take definite action. What action this will be, is yet unknown to the public. President Wilson alone knows. He may sever diplomatic relations or he may call congress together to consider declaring war. Whatever he may have in mind, should Germany persist in carrying on her submarine warfare in violation of law and the dictates of humanity, this country will face a situation the like of which she has never before faced. There is impending a danger for which immediate preparation should be begun.

PROHIBITION MEETING MONDAY.

Well Attended Meeting in the Court House Monday Morning. Precinct committeemen and others interested in the campaign for state-wide prohibition met in the court house Monday morning and laid plans for a thorough campaign in this county. The meeting was presided over by Mr. C. B. Bobo and Mr. W. A. Baldwin offered prayer. Several lines of activity in the campaign were decided upon. First, it was decided to inaugurate a campaign to systematically organize all the prohibition forces so that the full strength would be voted when the election is held August 10th. Next a resolution was passed requesting the ministers of the county to open their pulpits the two Sundays preceding the election when speakers will be secured to address the congregations along prohibition lines. Then it was decided to hold a mammoth rally day at Laurens on some day early in September, when prominent speakers from a distance will be secured to address the assembled people. The names of Ex-Gov. Glenn, of North Carolina, and Congressman R. P. Hobson were mentioned as possible speakers. The meeting was dismissed with prayer by Rev. C. F. Rankin.

Cleve McPherson, also accused of being an accessory, was released some time ago on \$1,000 bond. It is understood that the attorneys for Will Martin will make a further effort to secure bail.
