ONE OF LYNCHERS MAY BE ARRESTED

Intimated That Identity of One of Mob Has Been Made Known.
Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 21.—It was intimated in official circles here tonight that the identity of a member of the so-called "Vigilance committee" that lynched Leo M. Frank was known to certain officials and that the information probably would be laid before Gov. Harris next week.
Nothing that seemed likely to lead to identification of any of the men had come to the governor today, he announced. He said early in the day that he was not making public all steps he had taken to investigate the abduction and lynching and this caused some speculation. The statement even was interpreted by some to mean that he knew who some of the men were but he later said there was no such significance to his words.
Gov. Harris today conferred with Herbert Clay, solicitor for the Blue Ridge circuit in which Cobb county is situated, and Judge J. H. Patterson, superior court judge in that circuit. After a long conference late today Judge Patterson let it be known that he would prepare a special charge to the grand jury which will meet September 1.
Mr. Clay assured the governor he would do all within his power to find and bring to trial the men responsible.

The State Conference of Charities and Correction will meet September 7, 8 and 9 at Columbia, in conjunction with the Conference for Common Good. Importance of topics to be presented by these sessions should bring a large attendance of people who believe that our penal and charitable methods are not what they should be, and ought to be made better. Distinguished speakers from a distance, as well as home talent, will lead in discussions bearing specially on the feeble-minded and the short-term offender. All interested persons are invited to attend these conferences.
