Letter to the Patrons of Laurens City Schools:

We ask for the co-operation and support of the citizens of the city of Laurens in three separate undertakings of our school work for the session of 1915-16. First, we hope to give our boys in the higher grades some military training and discipline which we believe will be helpful and following is our plan. Mr. R. C. Hilton, a graduate of The Citadel, will be teacher of the seventh grade boys and he will drill the seventh grade boys in squad movements for a few weeks before he provides them with light-weight rifles. After drilling the seventh grade boys for a few weeks, we hope to add a few high school boys to our company from time to time until we have the whole high school induded. The military training will be entirely optional. Boys will be given their choice between a study period or a drill period. An enterprising Laurens citizen who is a Citadel graduate says that he and other Citadel men of the city will offer a prize to the boy who shows the most improvement in his drilling for the school session; and we hope to give the boys who make satisfactory progress in this work an encampment trip at the close of school.

We also hope to have medical inspection of our school children this session. A great many children have physical defects and impairments of which they and their parents know nothing. Some of these impairments are decayed teeth, impaired hearing, defective eye-sight, enlarged tonsils, adenoid growths and the like. The dentists and physicians of the town have very kindly consented to give enough of their time to examine every child in town who wishes to take advantage of the opportunity to find out whether or not he has any physical defects that will hinder him in his school work. When a physical defect is discovered, the parents or guardian of the child will be notified as to the nature of the defect and then the parents can have the dentist or physician of their choice to treat the child. No child will be required to take the examination.

Instead of the three year, one course curricula, the high school now offers two four year curriculae. These curriculae follow:

Classical Curricula. First Year:

English Gram, and Lit. History, Ancient. Algebra Arithmetie

Second Year:

English Composition and Lit. History, Med. and Modern Algebra Arithmetic LATIN

Third Year:

English Rhetoric and Lit. History, English Geom., Plain LATIN

Fourth Year:

English Lit. and Gram. History of U. S. Geom., Solid and Alg. LATIN

Classical Curricula. First Year:

Eng. Gram, and Lit. History, Ancient Algebra Arithmetic PHYSIOLOGY

Second Year:

English Composition and Lit. History, Med. and Modern Algebra COMMERCIAL ARITHMETIC

Third Year:

Eng. Rhetorie and Lit. History, English Geom., Plane STENOGRAPHY & TYPEWRITING

Fourth Year:

Eng. Lit. and Gram. History of U. S. STENOGRAPHY & TYPEWRITING BOOKKEEPING

Pupils now beginning eighth or ninth grade work may take their choice between the Classical or commercial courses. A pupil who takes Latin in the eighth grade this year may not change to the Commercial course next year. Pupils and parents must decide which course they like best and then abide by their decision. The Classical course prepares pupils for the Freshman class of most of the colleges of the United States and for the sophmore class of most of our local colleges,

Pupils taking the commercial course may graduate from Winthrop, Clemson, The Citadel, and The University of South Carolina in four years. We call the attention of our patrons to the fact that those pupils who take all of the work in either curricula will be given a diploma. If you have a boy or girl in the eighth or ninth grade this year, we ask you to consider which course you wish him or her to take. We believe our commercial course will be as good as is given by any business college in South Carolina. If you are interested, we shall be glad to talk over this matter of optional courses with you.


