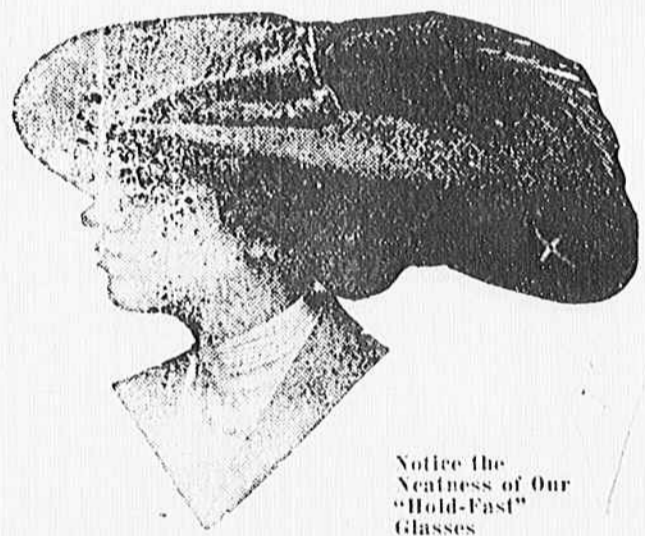

LISBON NEWS.

Lisbon, Oct. 4.—The farmers are going right along getting their cotton out but the rain came last week, and stopped all hands. We were needing rain so that we could commence to sow small grain. Vetch and clover have been sown but the ground was so hard, the preparations were not as they should have been. The much needed rain will fix the land so that we can sow more oats than ever, and soon get ready to get the land in apple pie order—that we may sow more wheat, in fact break the record in Laurens county. We have the right kind of soil and can make the wheat if we will sow enough of it. No brother farmers, we saw last January that on account of the foreign wars, we would have to change our way of farming, so we cut our acreage, then we cut our fertilizer bill and that within itself meant more food stuff for man and beast and less cotton and we are going to realize twice as much for our cotton, so you see for yourself that supply and demand runs the market in any commerce, so let us attend these meetings and see what we can learn from each other, and at the same time organize, get together and stand together, make cotton for a living price with plenty of hog and hominy, and then you will not have to sell your cotton until it gets above the cost of production. Let us go into the cattle and hog business.

Col. N. B. Dial has offered to get us a thoroughbred bull, of any breed we wish, and help us that we may help ourselves, so let us get out of this one idea of farming, make everything you need on the farm, then make all the cotton you can, by that you will always get a living price for your cotton. The cotton crop is going to be very short this time, and if Mr. McCray will observe more closely, he will find out that the man who picks cotton every day, is correct when he says the crop in Laurens county is going to be extremely short this time. His last report will show it, and if it doesn't we will set him up to a \$5.00 John B. Stetson hat. A man can't tell much about a cotton field riding along the road, but you put an old time picker in the field and see what he has to say after he goes over the field.

And good manners can characterize the humblest citizen as well as the millionaire. No teacher should be permitted in the schools whose voice is not well modulated and whose manners could not be taken as a model by the children who spend so great a part of their time with her.

Good manners should not be a class asset, but should be a national characteristic.—Exchange.

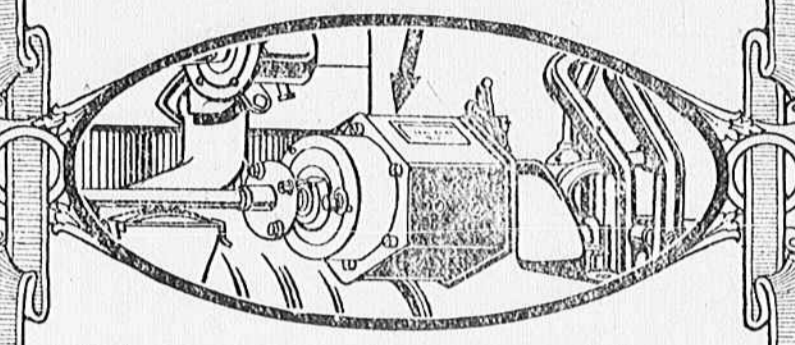

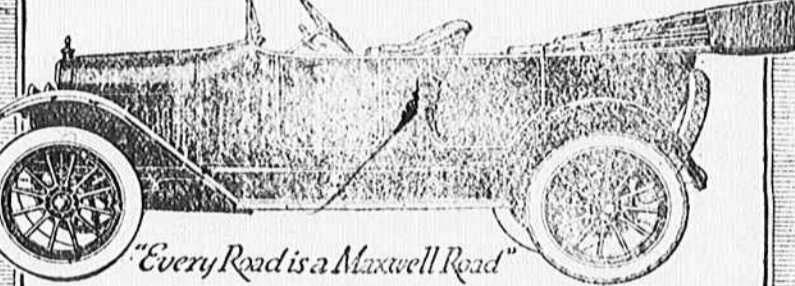
