AFFIDAVIT AGAINST CHARLESTON CHIEF

John J. Healy Declares He Saw the Chief Shoot at H. J. Brown While Several Were Holding Brown, Who is a Member of the City Democratic Executive Committee.

Charleston, Oct. 6.—An affidavit made by John J. Healy accuses Chief of Police Cantwell with having fired a shot at a member of the executive committee, H. J. Brown, a Hyde man, while Brown was being held by others men.

Healy's affidavit follows: State of South Carolina, Charleston County.

Personally appeared before me John J. Healy, who, being duly sworn, says that "I was at executive committee's headquarters, corner George and King streets from 11 p. m. yesterday until the executive committee started to have its meeting today. I was there as a watcher in Major Hyde's interest mentioned there with several others. I was standing at the door between the two rooms when Capt. Black ordered everybody except executive committeemen to get out of the front room. Rentiers came out, with Maxy Goldman behind him. While O'Brien started to strike Maxy Goldman and Rentiers told him he was too small for him to strike. Then Rentiers and O'Brien started to get into an argument and Frank Hogan started to argue with him. William Wingo then caught Rentiers from the back, with his arm around Rentiers' neck. I caught Wingo's arm and told him to turn Rentiers loose. When Rentiers turned around Harry Wianski took a pistol out of Rentiers' back pocket and they all hollered "Arrest him," and Sergeant Quinn took him off. Then the commotion started in the door. Roseberry and Frank Hogan started to abuse me, and in the confusion Chief Cantwell took a pistol out of my pocket, I had the pistol as a deputy constable, appointed by the door, and Chief Cantwell and Mr. Turner Logan came in with drawn guns pointing inside. I begged them not to shoot. Mr. Logan put his gun down, but Chief Cantwell fired a shot at Henry Brown while several were holding Brown. Some one, I think Mr. Robson, grabbed Chief Cantwell's hand with pistol and begged him not to shoot. So I waited a while and went to the telephone at Mr. Cook's and telephoned to the sheriff's office to send some men up. Then I went back up to the executive committee's room. There was no more shooting. About two hours later Mayor Grace and Chief Cantwell came to the hall and ordered Brennan to take me to the station for carrying concealed weapons. I walked up with Detective Brennan and was released on putting up a deposit of \$20. J. J. HEALY.
