HEFLIN PREDICTS 20 CENT COTTON

Mabama Congressman Says Bale of Cotton will Bring \$100.

Washington, Oct. 17 .- That cotton vill sell at \$100 a bale before Christmas and cotton seed at \$65 a ton was the confident prediction of Congressman Heflin of Alabama here today. In a statement urging that Southern cotton growers stick to the plan of holding their staple for a price Heflin said the mills of this country will demand three-fifths of the entire crop this

Ten million bales will constitute the entire cotton production of the country this year, according to Heffin. Of this the mills will take six million, he says, leaving only four million to be divided between export and munitions .manufacture. Heflin points out that sine August last year we have exported almost as much as the entire crop this year will aggre-

"The European nations are already paying fabulous prices for secondary productions of cotton, such as dry batteries and pierie acid, used in making explosives," says the statement. "And cotton for smokeless powder and other explosives will be in greater demand than ever before.

"Cotton prices are bound to be higher, higher than at any time since the war between the states. The European nations are going to pay and ought to pay 20 cents a pound for cotton before long. Germany is already in the Southern market, buying and storing cotton."

Congressman Heffin said the holding movement is getting a grip on the South and there will be no backsliders to let the price barrier down be low what is proper. He expressed doubt whether there would be sufficient to supply the spinners of the

Strange Rock Dweller. One of the strangest creatures known to science is the pholas, or boring clam. When still very minute the animal bores into the sandstone ledges at extreme low water, by means of its sharp shell, which is replaced by secretions as it is worn away. It penetrates the rock to a depth of six or eight inches, and hollows out its burrow as it increases in size. Shaped roughly like a top, it could not leave its rock dwelling even if it wished to do so. For food, it depends on the animalcules that float in sea water, which it seizes by its long siphon, or tongue. The pholas is in great demand at the seaside resorts along the Pacific coast, for its meat is very tender and makes excellent soup. The clams are dislodged in great numbers from the ledges by the use of dynamite, although it is possible to obtain them with a pick and crowbar.

The Books of the County Treasurer State, County and Commutation Road Taxes for fiscal year, 1915, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31st, 1915. After Decemper 31st one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after February 28th. seven per cent will be added till the 15th day of March, 1916, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one Township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several Townships in which the pro-perty is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be

attached.
All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00 except old soldiers, who are exempt at 50 years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty.
