EXPECTED ACTION.

Friends of Judge Johnson Look for His Confirmation.

Spartanburg, Jan. 23.—Local friends of Judge Joseph T. Johnson, of the United States court for the western district of South Carolina, will be disappointed if the United States Senate does not confirm the Judge's appointment tomorrow.

The delay in his confirmation has occasioned considerable speculation in South Carolina, but the most recent information from Washington is to the effect that the senate will act on Monday. Judge Johnson is serving as judge of the new federal district under a recess appointment by President Wilson.

Confirmed Soon, Says Nicholls.

Greenville, Jan. 23.—A letter has been received in Greenville from Congressman Sam J. Nicholls, in which the statement was made that Joseph T. Johnson would soon be confirmed as federal judge of the western district of South Carolina. There has been something which to outsiders has seemed peculiar in the delay on the part of the senate in confirming this recess appointment made by President Wilson. The letter from Congressman Nicholls stated that there had been, several months ago, prior to the assuming of the judgeship by Judge Johnson, certain protests made upon him, and that the department of justice, acting in accord with custom, turned these over to the judiciary committee of the United States senate. Judge Johnson has been in Washington for some days.

Time for Cleaning Streams in Laurens County.

State of South Carolina, County of Laurens.

Pursuant to an Act of the General Assembly of South Carolina, therefore providing:

Be it resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of Laurens County in the state aforesaid:

That the following periods be and the same are hereby fixed for the cleaning of streams within said county for and during the year A. D. 1916, to wit:

All land owners and persons in charge of land are hereby notified and required to clean their streams within the above named periods.

Done at Laurens C. H., S. C., in regular annual meeting, this 6th day of January, A. D., 1916.

License Fees for Hawkers and Peddlers in Laurens County for the year A. D. 1916.

State of South Carolina, County of Laurens. By virtue of an Act of the General Assembly of South Carolina providing therefor.

the License Fees to be paid by hawkers and peddlers doing business within said county during the year A. D. 1916, be and the same are hereby fixed in the following amounts, to wit:

For foot peddlers of goods, wares, and merchandise, Fifteen Dollars; Peddlers of merchandise in two horse wagon, Fifty Dollars; Peddlers of merchandise in one horse wagon, Thirty Dollars; Peddlers of stoves or ranges, for the first wagon, Seventy-Five Dollars; and for each additional wagon operated by the same firm, Fifty Dollars. Peddlers of clocks, Fifty Dollars for the first wagon and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon operated by the same firm;

Peddlers of lightning rods, Thirty Dollars for the first wagon and Fifteen Dollars for each additional wagon operated by the same firm;

Peddlers of spectacles, on foot, Ten Dollars; Peddlers of spectacles in vehicle, Twenty Dollars;

Peddlers of sewing machines, Fifty Dollars for the first wagon and Thirty Dollars for each additional wagon operated by the same firm;

Peddlers of pianos or organs, for each wagon operated, One Hundred and Thirty-Five Dollars. All licenses to be issued by the Clerk of Court of said county and to be of force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1916, as provided by law. Provided that all licenses issued after the thirtieth day of June shall be for Two-Thirds of the above named rates. Done in regular annual meeting at Laurens C. H., S. C., this 6th day of January, A. D. 1916.
