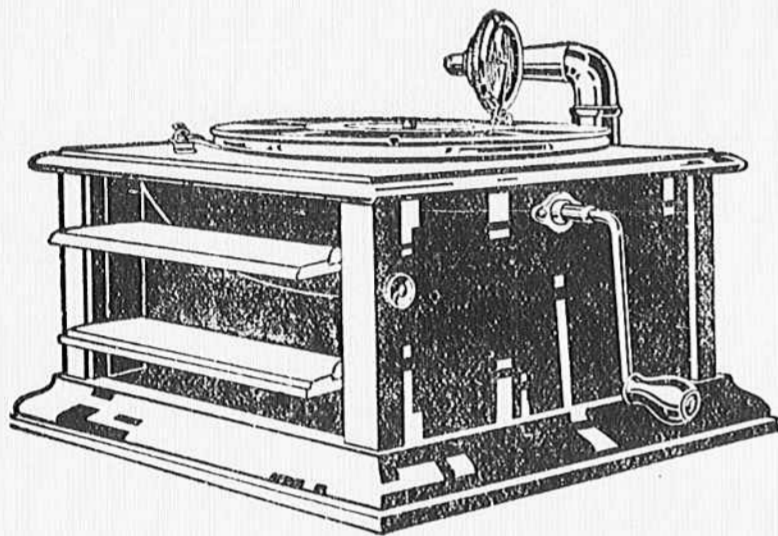

MOTOR CAR OF TODAY A WONDER

Twice as good as the car of three years ago, and at half the cost. Maxwell Man Reviews Lessons from stock car feat on Pacific Coast.

The motor car of today—the light, economical, four-cylinder motor car such as four out of five buyers select—is practically twice as good and costs about half as much as the car which, three years ago, was a reasonably satisfactory article.

This is a statement easily susceptible of proof. Nor need we go further than these three short, lively years to get all the proof we need.

Three years ago the Contest Board of the American Automobile Association sanctioned what proved to be the most remarkable achievement on its records up to that time. It was an officially observed run in which a car covered, without a motor stop, a total of 12,401.9 miles.

Motorists marveled. So stupendous was the achievement that, for three years, this car remained the endurance champion—remained so in spite of the fact that its parent factory had in the meantime, passed out of existence.

But the champion of 1912 has been dethroned. A 1916 Maxwell touring car now wears the crown—wears it with a total non-stop mileage of 22,922.3, nearly twice as great as that of the old champion. Again motorists stand amazed at the most recent feat of automobile endurance.

How great an advancement is the car of the present over the car of three years ago is easiest appreciated by a comparison of the details of their record feats.

The old champion weighed 2,600 pounds, traveled 12,401.9 miles, averaging 109 miles each day, covered 13 miles to the gallon of gasoline and could be duplicated in the open market for \$1,500. Its run was ended by the motor's failure to perform further without repair.

The new champion weighed 1950 pounds, ran 22,922.3 miles, averaged 500 miles a day, covered 22 miles to the gallon and cost \$655. It was purposely stopped in first-class running order and in the final 24 hours covered its greatest daily distance—more than 560 miles.

COLE L. BLEASE MAKES DEFINITE ANNOUNCEMENT

Issues Statement That He will be Candidate for Governor and Tells Some of the Things he Stands For.

Columbia, S. C., Feb. 22, 1916. To The Democratic Voters of South Carolina:—

I am receiving and have been for some time, so many personal communications in reference to my becoming a candidate for Governor this year that I find it impossible to answer all of these personally. I, therefore, take this method of announcing that I am now a candidate for the nomination of Governor of the State of South Carolina, subject to the rules of the Democratic Primary, and at the time fixed by the rules of the Democratic party I shall file my pledge and pay my assessment as required thereunder.

My views on all public matters are so well known, and my record as Governor for four years, is so fresh in the minds of the people, that I hardly feel it necessary to here outline any platform. However, I will state that I shall favor, among other things, the following:

The Warehouse System, which was enacted into law while I was governor and which was recommended by me in my general message to the General Assembly.

A flat to-cent passenger rate on all railroads.

Local option by counties of the control of the whiskey question.

Liberal support of Confederate Veterans.

Liberal support for the State institutions for white boys and white girls.

Building up of the free school system, so that every white child in South Carolina may be given an education.

The making of 6 per cent. the legal rate of interest in this state.

The establishment of a rural credit system for the state.

The abolition of useless offices.

Laws that will favor and protect in all its legitimate purposes and such laws as will protect capital in its lawful investments.

Amending the constitution by striking out that section which provides for the payment of \$2,000 to the family of a negro who commits rape on a white woman and providing that in cases of rape a jury may be drawn immediately and a special court held within such time as the Chief Justice and the Governor may direct.

The reduction of taxation.

Providing a law that no officer elected by the people shall be removed from office unless convicted by a jury.

The decrease of present day lawlessness.

Biennial sessions of the General Assembly.

At the proper time and place I shall appear upon the rostrum and discuss these, and other matters of importance to the people of the state.
