STRICKEN AUGUSTA IS PLANNING TO REBUILD

Business Men Worging Together to Place the Unfortunate City Back

Among the South's Leading Cities. Augusta, Ga., March 23.—Augusta turned bravely about today and began to plan for replacing the ravages of the fire which last night caused a loss estimated at from \$5,000,000 to \$7,000,000. There are many, however, who are incluined to place—the estimate at \$10,000,000. The total loss is a mere guess and nothing definite will be known until a final checking up of accounts. This is the second disaster to Augusta within the last half dozen years. It had just overcome the loss caused by the disistrous flood of several years ago and vas fast developing—and now comes the great fire.

The business men today began marshaling their resources to meet the losses. Relief plans for the thousands of homeless people were given early consideration. The first event of the day was a meeting of city council when ample provision was made for the destitute. At noon hundreds of business men met at a mass meeting and it was determined that Augusta must rebuild at once on an even larger scale. The people are undaunted and have displayed the very finest kind of spirit. There has been no shirking and every man is doing his duty. The losses will touch every class of society in this city. There is a kindred feeling among all.

At a conference today a movement was set going to raise a fund of \$50,000 to prosecute relief work. It was announced late tonight that \$15,000 had already been subscribed. The ruling sentiment at a series of conferences for the destitute, although gifts from other sources will not be rejected.

Acting upon the suggestion of bankers, Mayor J. R. Littleton declared a moratorium for today, because many citizens were unable to meet their finanical obligations. The moratorium may be extended for several days.

A careful survey shows that 30 blocks, covering 118 acres, were swept bare by the fire of yesterday. An unofficial count gives the number of homes destroyed at 526. Over 130 business houses were burned. The total value of the houses was about \$2,250 000.

The three companies of State millitia were withdrawn from service today and the police have the situation under control

This afternoon several hundred workmen were put to work clearing up the debris about the burned buildseveral walls on Broad street. A large number of convicts will be brought in from the roads to assist in cleaning

Thousands of visitors from many sections of Georgia and South Carolina poured into Augusta today to view the ruins and all hotels were crowded closed today and all unoccupied buildngs, including the old federal building, were thrown open tonight for the accommodation of the homeless fami-

Only four firemen were injured dur- burns and bruises. at local hospitals tonight and all will recover, it was said.

Final figures would indicate that about 35,000 bales of cotton were destroyed, causing a loss of approximately \$1,800,000.

No figures are obtainable as to the amount of insurance carried on the properties destroyed. The insurance adjusters began to arrive in Augusta today. The adjustment will be made as rapidly as possible, it was said.

Twenty blocks in the residence section of Augusta today presented the appearance of a windswept prairie and the bare walls of six business blocks bear silent testimony of Augusta's most serious disaster of recent years

The fire which raged for more than nine hours last night, causing a loss estimated at from \$5,000,000 to \$7,-000,000 was brought to a halt early this morning after it had crossed Green street.

An area of about one and onefourth square miles was ravaged by 000; John J. Evans company, \$20,000; the flames which were driven by a heavy March gale. The wind stopped blowing just after 1 o'clock and it was then that the firemen checked the flames.

> Estimates today placed the number of residences destroyed at between 600 and 700, including some of the finest old homes in Augusta. No estimate can be placed on the value of the contents of the homes. The owners saved practically nothing. Today over 3,000 persons were homeless. Many spent the night walking the streets, while others slept in the halls of large hotels.


Officials of the fire department to day began an investigation into the cause of the fire, but as yet no ex- 🌑 planation has been offered. The only thing developed is that the fire started yesterday afternoon at 6:15 o'clock near an elevator shaft in the Kelly dry goods store in the Dyer building at the corner of Eighth and Broad

The ten story building occupied by the Augusta Chronicle was practically destroyed by the fire. The loss on this building is \$180,000. The Empire Life building, several doors away, was damaged to the extent of about \$200,-000, it is estimated.

The losses on the 800 block of Broad street are approximately as follows: Dyer building, \$750,000; Richards Stationery company, \$25,000; Warren building and contents, \$150,000. The losses on the Broad street frontage are: Union Savings bank buildig. \$60,000; Postal Telegraph plant, \$17,-000; Empire Life Insurance building, \$200,000; Chronicle building, \$180,-Western Union Telegraph plant, \$15,-000; Schneider building, \$15,000; Her ald building, \$15,000; Commercial club, \$35,000; Masonic temple, \$30,-000, and the Irish-American building \$25,000.

Three buildings in the 700 block, facing Broad street, the Citizens and Southern bank building, the Planters Loan and Savings bank building and the Georgia Railroad bank building, were not destroyed, although badly dam-

The 600 block of Broad street proved to be the miracle block of the fire. The flames leaped over this block and not one building was damaged until 5:30 this morning, when fire was discovered in a small warehouse. This blaze was estinguished by the Columbit fire team, the loss being small. -The State.




